

FIRED ON BY THE STRIKERS

West Virginia.

HUNTINGTON, W. Va., June 24 .- Today a posse of Deputy United States Marshals, led by A. C. Hufford, of Bluefields, were fired on by the strikers, and forced to flee from the coal fields at Mateawan. On their journey to Bluefield, the officers were forced to travel twentyfive miles on foot, owing to the destruction of the railroad by flood. They reached Mateawan Sunday evening, and immediately began serving notices of the injunction, which had been issued by Judge Jackson, of the federal court. A mob of strikers followed, armed to the teeth with firearms. On all sides could be heard the cry "Down with govern ment by injunction." Women called the vengeance of heaven upon the marshals, and children hurled stones at them. TERRIBLE FLOOD IN WEST VIRGINIA

The Dalles

Frightful Loss of Life and Immense Property Damage Result From Cloudburst and Flood.

BLUEFIELD, W. Va., June 24.-This section has been visited by a flood, the extent of which, in all probality, equals or exceeds that of Johnstown in 1889, so far as the loss of property is concerned. Early Saturday morning, shortly after midnight, a heavy downpour of rain began, accompanied by a severe electric storm, which increased in volume, continuing for several hours. The storm continued throughout the entire day and night.

NEW YORK, June 24.- Mayor Land, of Bluefield, W. Va., wires as follows:

"It is estimated that 200 lives were lost in the Elkhorn-Creek flood. The damage to the Norfolk & Western railroad is estimated at \$500,000, and to the coal companies and individuals at \$2,-000,000. There is no communication with any point further down the valley than Elkhorn. I am unable to tell whether outside assistance will be needed until further information comes in."

HUNTINGTON, W. Va., June 24 .- Governor White is here making arrangements to get tents and provisions for the flood-stricken district along the Norfolk & Western railroad. He says he fears the death list will exceed 1000.


