TO CROWN EDWARD VII

Coronation of England's King Will Occur Next June—Royal Proclamation of Event Made in London.

LONDON, June 28.—The royal proclamation announcing that the coronation of King Edward is to take place in June next, the exact date not yet being determined upon, was read this morning at St. James's Palace, Temple Bar and the Royal Exchange, with all the quaint, medieval scenes which marked the occasion of the proclamation of the accession of the king. Today's ceremonial was unheralded but crowds quickly gathered.

The ceremony began at St. James's, where, from the purple-draped balcony of the palace the Norroy King-at-Arms (William Henry Weldon) in a brilliant uniform, accompanied by the heralds and pursuivants in gorgeous dress and numerous state officials, read the proclamation.

At the appointed hour four state trumpeters, lavishly adorned in gold embroidered tunics, appeared in front of the balcony. At their sides stood the Norroy King-at-Arms, flanked by two royal maces, bearing gold maces, and surrounded by the blue mantle (Gordon Ambrose de Lisle Lee) the Rouge Dragon (Evard Green), the Somerset Herald (Henry Farnham Burke), the York Herald (Alfred Scott-Gattly) and the Windsor Herald (William Alexander Lindsay), all in their full regalia and the Earl Marshal (the Duke of Norfolk), the Lord Steward (the Earl of Pembroke), the Lord Chamberlain (the Earl of Clarendon) and others.

The trumpeters sounded a protracted fanfare and then the Norroy King-at-Arms bared his head and read the proclamation in a clear voice, which must have been audible to the royal party occupying a stand on the grounds of Marlborough House, facing the balcony of the palace.

King Edward wore an admiral's uniform. Queen Alexandra and the others of the royal party watched the ceremony with the greatest interest, the king using field glasses to obtain a clearer view.

As the Norroy King-at-Arms concluded with the words "God save the King," the trumpets again sounded the fanfare, the king standing at the salute.

A procession was then formed, led by a detachment of the Horse Guards, five royal carriages containing the heralds, pursuivants and other officials proceeded to Temple Bar and the Royal Exchange, where the formalities, less picturesque, perhaps, were repeated.

Lord Mayor Green and the sheriffs met the procession at Temple Bar.

No Saloons; No Money.

WOODBURN, June 28.—The city council met last night in special session. The ordinance providing for licensing and controlling saloons was repealed. This was done to release the Star Brewing Company of a bond to pay six months' license, in a town having no licensed saloons.

There having been no tax levy, and consequently no income to the city, the council voted to discontinue the street lights July 1. Manager Kurtz and Attorney Morcom, of the Electric Light works, who hold a two years' contract from the city for lighting the streets, declare they will continue the lights regardless of the council's action. There is a possibility of an agreement being reached and some of the lights contracted for by the city.

The largest crowd ever in Woodburn will be here on the Fourth. The exercises will be very interesting, the parade the finest ever seen in the city, while two bands will discourse music. A big show in a pavilion at night will be the means of doubling the number of visitors here on that day.

AN APPEAL TO CONGRESS

States Will Ask Government to Aid New York Canal—Project Involves the Expenditure of About \$300,000,000.

NEW YORK, June 28.—A special to the Tribune from Albany, N. Y., says: Mr. Bond, state engineer, is authority for the statement that a few days ago he received a visit from two engineers who brought him a letter of introduction from Mr. Hay, secretary of state. Their name he had forgotten. These gentlemen said the object of their visit was to secure a copy of Mr. Bond's recent elaborate report upon the probable cost of constructing a large canal across this state. They stated that practically every state in the Northwest is in favor of the construction of a larger canal over this state for the sake of lowering the cost of transportation of wheat and other products to Eastern markets. The failure of the canal men of this state last winter, however, to come to any agreement upon a plan for canal improvement was discouraging to Western shippers, and therefore they now thought an appeal should be made to congress to improve the canals of New York at the expense of every state in the Union.

The Western engineers said that it is believed that a 21-foot canal should be built from Buffalo to Lake Ontario and then from Oswego, on Lake Ontario, to the Hudson River. A canal twenty-one feet in depth would cost about \$300,000,000. The United States, the Western engineers said, will have to undertake it. New York state cannot be expected alone to accept such a financial burden. Further, the Western visitors said that before congress meets again, in their belief the congressmen from Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa, South Dakota, Nebraska and North Dakota would come to an agreement upon a policy of canal improvement to be undertaken by the United States government, and that this policy would include a 21-foot canal from Lake Erie to Lake Ontario to the Hudson river.

The Hot Wave.

NEW YORK, June 28.—New York experienced the hottest weather of the year today the thermometer registering 92 degrees. In Greater New York eight deaths and fifty prostrations were reported up to midnight. In Jersey City and near-by towns in New Jersey, about twenty prostrations occurred, but no deaths. Tonight a gentle breeze cooled the atmosphere somewhat.

OMAHA, Neb., June 28.—Today was the hottest June day on the records of the weather bureau, the thermometer reaching 100 degrees. The whole week has been a record-breaker. Wednesday the register was 98, and 96 was the minimum high point for the week.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., June 28.—The temperature at 4 p. m., was 100. Michael Carter, a plasterer, was overcome by the heat, and his condition is critical.

PITTSBURG, June 28.—While the maximum temperature today was but 88 and the minimum 70, three deaths and several prostrations were reported.

CHICAGO, June 28.—This was the eighth day of the hot wave. The temperature reached 93 degrees. There were no deaths.
