EASTERN OREGON'S RIGHTS

The time has come for Eastern Oregon to assert its rights, especially in a political way, says the Baker City Democrat. The whole machinery of state government is bossed and controlled by Portland and the so-called Willamette valley. Eastern Oregon has nothing to do at the polls but vote for a Willamette valley man for every state office. This kind of thing has got to be looked upon as a matter of course by Western Oregon politicians and they don't seem to have any inclination to jai loose.

The Democrat is not so hide-bound in politics that it would not like to see a change. The present is the opportune time—this early before the politicians have fixed things—for Eastern Oregon republicans and democrats to demand that Eastern Oregon be recognized and if their wishes are not acceded to, to pool issues and fight it out to the bitter end. The Democrat wants an Eastern Oregon man for governor and will sacrifice some things to see its wishes carried out. It has become very weary of the machine work of the Portland politicians and is ready to assist in any fair way to break the "ring" methods now in vogue and which have been practiced for many years. Eastern Oregon

has men of equal brain with those of Western Oregon and they are just as competent to discharge official duties. Then, why play second fiddle or no fiddle at all, as we have in the past?

The two leading papers of Baker City, the Democrat and Republican, as well as the two leading papers of Pendleton, the East Oregonian and Tribune, are urgent in their demand that Eastern Oregon shall have the representation that its population and geographical and commercial importance entitle it to in the distribution of the offices of the state. The Democrat and East Oregonian, notwithstanding their strong democratic proclivities, plainly intimate that they are not so hide bound in politics that they would not like to see a change, even if it should be effected by pooling issues with the republicans. There is justice in the protest of these papers against a practice that appears to take it for granted that all state officers of any importance must be filled by Western men. Pooling of issues, however, is not likely to happen, but if the republicans of Eastern Oregon, who are largely in the ascendancy, could be got to make a united demand of the republican state convention for what is just and reasonable and also unite solidly on the candidates they desire to have nominated, Western Oregon republicans would be confronted with a condition they could not ignore. If, on the contrary, we demand the earth and present a multitude of candidates for every office, we shall get what we have been getting for years and what under the circumstances we deserve—namely, nothing.

Pendleton has two candidates for governor, Judge Lowell, who seems to be boozing himself, and Bunker J. W. Furnish, who is boozed by the Pendleton Tribune. If Eastern Oregon republicans could be got to settle on some one able, representative man for governor the situation would be decidedly interesting for Tall Timothy.

Though the democratic party ridicules the third party movement, this is no sign that it will not accept its platform later on, thus repeating its populistic flop of 1896.
