Damaged Wheat

Recent report of damage done to wheat by the frosts and cold weather of a month ago, the Dalles Dispatch says:

Farmers in the vicinity of Dufur are reporting very serious damage to their wheat fields. Opinion is divided as to the cause, some claiming it to be the frosts of two or three weeks ago, while others think it to be the Hessian fly or joint worm. Whatever may be the cause, undoubtedly considerable damage has been done, the grain seeming to die from the head down. So seriously are some fields affected that they are being cut for hay. Johnston Bros., C. P. Bach and W. H. Sigman, who have several hundred acres each, will cut about one-

fourth of their ground for hay. No damage is reported from the Tygh Ridge country, but the damaged belt is said to extend east to the Deschutes river. The Dispatch hopes that the loss will not prove as great as present appearances would indicate.

The Grass Valley Journal quotes the following from a letter of W. L. Vanderpool, of Dufur, to C. Moore, of Grass Valley: "We sincerely hope that your grain prospects are more flattering than ours. Such crops as the Johnston Bros., Bales, on Dufur ranch, and my own are damaged full 50 per cent. In fact we are cutting all of ours for hay; they claim it to be frosts, acre after acre is standing green to the ground perfectly dry. Have not heard from the country generally, and trust we are the only ones to suffer."
