 Prof. Cordley's Discovery.

After wrestling diligently with the problem for several weeks, Professor Cordley has finally discovered the secret of why spots of growing wheat in fields in Linn county and elsewhere are decaying, says the Corvallis Times. The wheat was unthrifty in appearance, and at the roots seemed rotten. By a gentle pull it was easily possible to separate the lower stem from the roots.

With powerful microscopes, Professor Cordley and Professor Pernot have been making a study of the diseased samples at the experiment station since the first was received from Linn county several weeks ago. Last week samples came from the farms of William Robinet, near Halsey, and H. C. Jordan, near Albany, and while examining these Tuesday afternoon Professor Cordley discovered the secret of the disease. The affection is a parasitical fungus that thrives most markedly in the crown of the wheat, that is, near where the stalk branches out into roots. With the microscope the fungus could be plainly seen in the tissues of the stalk. The disease is supposed to be unknown in the United States, as there is no mention of it in any of the mycological literature yet published in this country.
