Town's Resuscitation of Silver.

Charles A. Towne, whose arguments for free silver were considered the ablest presented on that side of the question in the campaign of 1896, has been interviewed by the New York Sun, and is thus reported:

"The free silver question is absolutely dead in the West. It will not only be a failure in 1904, but I do not believe it will be mentioned in the democratic platform or campaign. Our position on free silver in 1896 and 1897 was misunderstood. We were not demanding more money and profit for the silver mines, but more money for the country to keep up prices. God in his wise providence has provided a vast increase in the supply of gold, and today there is more money in the country than there would have been if the gold supply had remained stationary and the mints had been opened to the free coinage of silver. So long as the present condition continues, or the supply of gold continues to increase there can be no successful or serious demand for the free coinage of silver. Certainly that demand cannot again be made an issue in a national campaign until there is a big change in industrial or financial conditions."

Mr. Towne's remarks are interesting because he has been the recognized leader of the free silver men, and not because they contain any news of a scoop value.

Suit Against Davis Beirs.

Bruce, Mont., July 25.—Eva A. Ingersoll, of Doble Ferry, N. Y., widow of the late Robert G. Ingersoll, and administratrix of his estate, brought suit in the district court here today against several heirs of the estate of Andrew J. Davis to recover judgment for \$65,000, with interest from August 24, 1897, for legal services rendered by Ingersoll during the time of the trial of the suit involving the validity of the alleged will of the dead millionaire, A. J. Davis. Plaintiff alleges Mr. Ingersoll was to be paid \$100,000 for his work, but afterwards a compromise was effected among the heirs, and the alleged will was admitted to probate. She says the compensation promised Ingersoll has not been paid, except \$5,000.
