Pretoria Man Tells a Terrible Tale-Kruger's Message to America.

CHICAGO, July 29 .- "The horror of the estuation in the Boer reconcentrado camps in South Africa is appalling. Men, wemen and children are dying at the rate that would mean the extermination of the race in nine years. The people are cooped up in unsanitary quarters, where they are unable to secure sufficient food or clothing, with disease making terrible ravages among them."

This was the situation in the Transvaal and Orange Free State depicted tonight at the Christian Reformed Church germ disease, but allays inflammation, by the Rev. Herman D. Tan Brockhuysen, late pastor of the leading Dutch Reformed church of Pretoria. He has come to the United States to raise money to alleviate the sufferings of his coun- almanac. trymen who are huddled together in the refugee camps. It is the intention of Mr. Brockhuysen to travel through the coundenominations and describing the real situation throughout South Africa. The funds he is able to secure will be sent direct to Pretoria.

Regarding the outcome of the struggle, Mr. Brockhuysen is still optimistic. He believes the Boers will continue fighting until they eventually tire out Great Britain. "It is quite impossible to estimate the number of burghers now in the field," he said, "but the force is undoubtedly much larger than when Pretoria was taken."
