There is a belief among railroad men that the move of the Northern Pacific into the Klickitat country from its main line in the lower Yakima valley is a step toward the fulfillment of the promise to get down the Columbia to Portland, says the Oregonian. Of course no official declaration to this effect has been made, but the logic of the situation points to this as a probability. No secret is made of the fact that a Northern Pacific surveying crew is laying off lines toward the Klickitat country and the surveyors say a 15-mile branch will be built this season. There is little doubt that the Washington & Oregon, which is building between Kalama and Vancouver, is also a Northern Pacific enterprise. President Nelson has said repeatedly that the Northern Pacific would build down the Columbia if it should not get trackage over the O. R. & N. The circumstances being so favorable for making that promise a reality, it is believed that the operations in Klickitat mean a direct cutoff to Portland for the Northern Pacific.

Few migrations in the history of man may justly be compared to the coming of the pioneers of 1840, says the Oregonian. John Minto said in his address at the pioneer reunion of 1870 that the men, women and children of 1840 "crossed an unsettled country covering 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ degrees of longitude, every part of the way liable to attacks from savage foes." Of all the movements of man, Mr. Minto thought the journey of the Israelites from Egypt to Canaan offers the closest parallel to the immigration of 1840, the Israelites "being encumbered with their families, but there the distance was hundreds of miles while this was thousands." Spotswood was the pathfinder of the Alleghenies and Lewis and Clark were the pathfinders of the Rockies. The Irish-Scotch pioneers who filled the Shenandoah valley were the predecessors and, to a certain degree, the ancestors of the "sooners" who came to Oregon in 1840.

One exchange says: "It is reported that W. R. Hearst is to start a morning paper in Portland. According to the rumor, Mr. Hearst will spare no expense to make the paper the leading one of the Northwest. It is stated that publication of the paper will be commenced about January 1st." Let it come, and welcome. We shall then have a republican metropolitan paper or know the reason why, and not simply a mugwump, disgruntled organ that fights the party and maligns its leaders every month in the year except the one preceding a state or national election.

The wheat crop of the country this year is estimated at over 700,000,000 bushels. This is the largest crop ever harvested and means large exports, and a great deal of extra money for the farmer. Notwithstanding the enormous production the price will hold up, as there is an enormous demand in foreign countries for grain. If America is not a nation favored by Providence there never was one.
