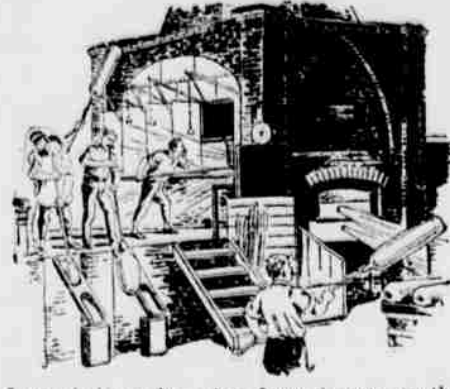

Important Tax Sale.

The CHRONICLE invites attention to the announcement of the sheriff in another column, giving notice that on Thursday, August 8th, he will sell at the front door of the court house to the highest bidder, for cash in hand, all of the property to which Wasco county has acquired title by virtue of previous sale for taxes and purchase at such sale by the county. This sale will be made by virtue of an act approved February 20, 1883, which authorizes county judges and clerks of school districts to bid in property sold for taxes and provides for the subsequent sale of the same. Section III of the law says:

On the first Monday after July 1, 1901, the sheriff of every county in this state in which lands have been heretofore bid in for taxes by such county, or any public corporation therein and to which they shall have acquired title as heretofore provided, shall proceed to sell such lands to the highest bidder for cash, in manner and form as upon sale under execution.

Section IV provides that as soon as practicable after such sales the sheriff gives to the purchaser deeds for the several parcels of land sold and such deeds shall vest in the purchasers title in fee thereto, indefeasible except as herein provided, and such title shall be superior to any lien, claim or charge whatever against such lands except the lien of a tax subsequent to that for which the land was sold.

Section V provides that such sales shall pass good for title notwithstanding imperfection in the description of such lands—provided that the person assessed shall at the time of the assessment, have been the owner of record—and notwithstanding the omission in the assessment roll of the name of the owner, or a mistake in the name of the owner—provided that the property be correctly described—and notwithstanding the omission on the part of the sheriff to make search or enquiry for personal property before selling the real property, or error of any kind made subsequent to the assessment.

The coming sale will clear up the assessment rolls from 1895 back to 1890. No attempt of this kind was ever made before in the history of Wasco county. Since the notice of this sale first appeared in THE CHRONICLE a great many persons that were delinquent for years have paid up and money is still coming at such a rate that no estimate can be made of the amount that will remain delinquent on sale day. It will probably not exceed \$2,000 in taxes and may not amount to more than half that sum.
