

WILLIAM A. NEWELL.

William A. Newell, formerly governor of the territory of Washington, died at Allentown, N. J., yesterday. He was over 88 years of age. Fifty years ago Governor Newell was a man of considerable prominence in the East. Although a physician in active practice he took an interest in politics and was a member of congress from New Jersey in 1847-49 and 1865-67. He was governor of that state in 1857-59. In 1874 he was a candidate for the same office, but was defeated by General George B. McClellan. In the year 1880 he was appointed governor of Washington territory and held the position till 1884. From 1884 to 1886 he was Indian commissioner in the territory.

Governor Newell's most conspicuous public work was the organization of the United States life saving service. He had observed the numerous disasters on the New Jersey coast year after year, and while a member of congress in 1848 secured an appropriation of \$10,000 for life saving work in his own state. Its value was appreciated almost immediately and from that small beginning has grown the widely extended and efficient service that is now found on the coasts of the United States.

Governor Newell's administration as governor was without notable incident, and after his retirement from that office he became less conspicuous as a public figure. Although over sixty years of age he resumed the practice of medicine and gave little attention to matters political. With the rise of populism in the last decade he left the republican party, with which he had been connected since its organization, and joined the new movement. A few years ago while still associated with that political organization he held his last public office, that of city physician of Olympia. Old age compelled the governor to give up his profession and he returned to the state which had conferred signal honors upon him in the past. In spite of a residence of twenty years on the Pacific coast he felt more at home in New Jersey, where he had passed the greater part of his life and with which he always associated his best achievements.—Spokesmen Review.
