Plot That Failed.

NEW YORK, Sept. 10.—Details of a previous plot against the life of President McKinley are given out on authority, it is said, by Senator T. E. Ellsworth, according to a special to the Tribune from Lockport, N. Y. He is credited with the statement that the plot was hatched in Paterson, N. J., about the first of May, and Emma Goldman, Luis Binestein and other prominent anarchists are said to have been concerned in it. A young tailor, Michael Anuzi, it is said, was the one to whose lot it fell to do the deed. At that time the president was on his tour of the West, and Anuzi left for San Francisco, where he expected McKinley would be by the time he reached there. But he arrived several days ahead, and attended several anarchist meetings, where he met a young man, to whom he told his purpose. The young man was none other than a secret service detective, and Anuzi was promptly arrested, but upon lack of evidence and certain advices from Washington, only the charge of vagrancy was entered against him. The condition of Mrs. McKinley is said to have had some bearing upon the matter, which was hushed up, the prisoner being sentenced to eight months in the San Francisco workhouse.

THE HERO OF THE HOUR IN ABERDEEN

Police Judge J. C. Pearson, Who Fined Anarchistic Incendiary.

ABERDEEN, Wash., Sept. 9.—Judge J. C. Pearson, who presides over the police court in this city, has come into prominence since the shooting of President McKinley, by his speech in court denouncing the remarks of a man about the town known as "Long Tom," a Frenchman, with anarchistic tendencies. "Long Tom" was on the street, near a crowd of men when the news of the attempted assassination was communicated to him, and he immediately said: "That's good. Now they ought to kill Mark Hanna and Roosevelt, and then let the people rule the country." These incendiary words set the teeth of every one who heard them on edge, and Chief of Police Graham to whom they were reported, lost no time in going to Judge Pearson and informing him of the declaration of "Long Tom." The city attorney was informed of the affair, but expressed the opinion that nothing could be done.

"I'll show you what can be done," said Judge Pearson, so he issued a warrant at once charging the man with a misdemeanor and using language of an incendiary and deeply insulting character on the streets of Aberdeen.

When "Long Tom" was brought into court the old judge's spirit was in a flame of excitement, and his speech denouncing the man before him was highly dramatic. In announcing the fine of \$25 and costs, he said: "This is the limit allowed by law, but by the great eternal, I wish it were twenty times as much."

Judge Pearson is highly patriotic. He served in the war of the rebellion, and only within a few weeks buried a son who was killed in battle in the Philippines. He is a native of Indiana, a graduate of the law department of Ann Arbor, the first probate judge of this section when the state was a territory, and the first prosecuting attorney when Washington became a state. He is a staunch republican and a loyal supporter of President McKinley.

The judge is now the hero of the hour in Aberdeen.
