AN ANARCHIST OR A FOOL?

The Goldendale Journal, a little democratic sheet that was conducted by P. P. McCully till that brother was promoted from the tripod of an editor to the tail end of a threshing machine, has now an "editor"—God save the mark!—whose lurid rhetoric reminds THE CHRONICLE of the sort of stuff certain escaped populist lunatics from Kansas used to dose the Kluckitaters with in the early and middle nineties. The theme, in this immediate instance, is different but the rhetoric has the same earmarks as that which immortalized Mary Yellin Lease, Sockless Jerry Simpson and the rest of the Pefferian school of oratory.

"Take all the fiends from out the depths of hell; all the miseries, woes, pains and crimes of all worlds, ages and climes, and all the vice and foul plots born in the deepest depths of darkness, and roll them in solid mass together, in concentrated force and form, and, though increased ten thousand fold, one scent of the foul breath or one moment of the debauched life of England and her devilish rulers, would as far exceed them all as does the brilliant rays of the noonday sun exceed the meager light of the small tallow dip.

"The Goddess of Liberty, whom we have chained, will some day break asunder those fetters and with her legions of mighty sons, who now toil from morn till night for greedy masters, will sweep across the continents and seas, and before them will be rushed, with the speed of the lightnings, the crumbling ruins of monarchy; and away down yonder in the yawning pits, where the sulphurous flames leap high, will be thrown the Edwards', the Nicholas', the Williams', the Hamid's and their like. Then the world will be free—yes, industrially free. The cry of the slave will be heard no more, the moans of the hungry will be quieted and the loud cursings of despair will be gone forever. Peace, sweet peace, from the eternal council chambers of heaven, will reign supreme."

THE CHRONICLE will bet a bundle of old CHRONICLES to a four bit piece that this brother is either an anarchist or a fool.

The La Grande Chronicle, speaking of the fight between Judge Lowell and W. J. Furnish, of Pendleton, for the republican gubernatorial nomination, says: "The contest between these two men will be a battle of giants. It would not be interesting if either was sure of winning, and it is going to be interesting." In point of fact it will have the same result as the famous battle of the Kilkeny cats. With the principals bitterly hostile to each other, as report goes, the defeat of one will mean the defeat of both.
