

FREEDOM OF SPEECH.

Hood River and White Salmon to Portland, round trip, \$2.20, including two admission tickets.

For the Episcopal church convention, San Francisco, Oct. 2, 1901, the O. R. & N. Co. will sell round trip tickets to San Francisco Sept. 23d, 24th, 25th, 26th and 27th, good from Portland via Southern Pacific Sept. 24th to 28th, \$28.50. From Portland via O. R. & N. steamers in both directions, cabin passage, meals and berth included \$23.50, dates of sailing from Portland to be announced later; final limit of tickets all rail November 15th, via steamer from San Francisco announced later.

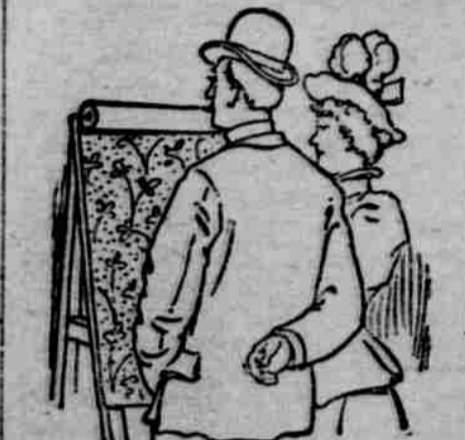
