

WHY NOT SPRAY?

Why don't you spray? asks the Walla Walla Union, and the question is equally pertinent here. You complain about worms in your apples and the shippers say they are not worth sending out of the country. Ask what the remedy is and they say if all the people would spray their trees this condition would not exist. Why don't they do it? Do they want poor fruit? Verily it would seem so.

Naturally, the Walla Walla valley is one of the best fruit growing sections on earth. There was a time when its apples and its pears were known and searched for all over the country. When one said his table fruit came from Walla Walla that settled it—every one wanted to eat of it, for it was known to be good. Today the apples and the pears are simply homes for bugs. Large families take up their residence in each apple and each pear and raise other large families. If this condition remains it will be but a short time until Walla Walla fruit will be black-balled in every market in the country.

All fruitmen agree that spraying is the only remedy for this terrible worm pest. Then why not spray? There are laws in the county which say certain forms shall be gone through. Are those laws enforced? Why is there a county fruit inspector if he does not see that they are? Why do not the fruitmen and the shippers get together and demand that this thing shall be done? There is a remedy and it should be applied.


