

Timber stealing and land grabbing are common events, says D. C. Ireland in the Moro Observer. But grabbing the Columbia river, for fish stealing, was reserved for an Astoria evader and trespasser. Washington claims jurisdiction over Bakers' bay, and an Olympia legislature enacted a law to prevent any one corporation or individual from putting more than three-pound nets (vile traps), into the waters of that bay. This was intended for fair play but the slippery Astorian put in twenty-seven traps, jumping nearly all there was in it, by organizing Fish Company This and Fish Company That, until the law had been complied with.
