Bust for Possession of Texas Gil Picks. MONTGOMERY, Ala., Oct. 10 .- W. A. Humpbreys, of Waco, Tex.; Marcus and G. M. T. Humphreys, of Annieton, Ala., and their relatives have begun suit for the possession of oil fields at Beaumont, Tex., upon which are situated fourteen oil wells. In the suit that has been brought against the capitalists now controlling the property it is claimed that when the oil fever struck Texas, Captain G. M. Lucas, J. M. McFadden and twenty-three others took possession of 5670 acres of oil land south of Beaumont. The value of the land is said to be \$25,-000,000. This property, according to the papers, rightfully belonged to the Hamphreys estate, and suit is entered against the capitalists for \$25,000 per year from each defendant for treepass upon the land, besides 85 cents per barrel on 5,000,000 barrels of oil shipped out of the state.


