

"LEFT BLOOMING ALONE."

There is something peculiarly sad and lugubrious in the following from the Astorian, which has heretofore been a consistent supporter of the Simon-Corbett-Scott faction, and is now, like hosts of others, beginning to find itself like Moore's last rose of summer:

"Is it possible, asks the Astorian, that Editor Scott aspires to be United States senator, or is this just a pipe dream of Editor Kincaid? . . . The course of the Oregonian recently indicates beyond doubt that 'a change has come over the spirit of its dreams,' and the most reasonable supposition is that its editor has surrendered to the Mitchell faction, in the belief that they will control the future politics of Oregon, as they have done for a quarter of a century, except when they were knocked out by the hold-up legislature of 1897, with the active support and encouragement of Mr. Scott, the writer of this, and many others who believed that they were acting on principle and for the best interests of the people generally, although they acted from different standpoints.
