

"As Others See Us."

The editor of the Oregon Agriculturist and Rural Northwest visited The Dalles fair and has this to say about it in his issue of October 15th:

"The district fair at The Dalles this year was a pleasing surprise in consideration of the fact that the proposition to hold it had been practically abandoned at one time but a few weeks before it was held. For some reason The Dalles has had the reputation of being a little slow, but no one could suspect the place of any lack of enterprise in viewing what they did for their fair. The money raised by subscription in the city amounted to nearly \$5,000, and the total expenditures are said to have been between \$7,000 and \$8,000. The fair grounds were fenced and a good deal of work done otherwise in improving the grounds. In the city the work of preparing for the street fair was done well and tastefully. There are some objections to splitting the fair into two parts, but there are also some advantages. The strongest objection to the plan is that it does not give the live stock at the fair grounds quite so good a chance to be seen as they ought to have. All live stock, except poultry, were shown at the fair grounds, while the other agricultural exhibits were made in the street fair.

"Of the agricultural exhibits in the street fair the display of fruit was the most important feature. Taken as a whole it is probably the best display of fruits which has been made at any Oregon fair this year.

"There was an excellent display of garden vegetables, the largest collection being shown by Mr. A. Sandz. His exhibit contained some very striking and attractive features, including a number of bearing plants in tubs. The section about The Dalles is especially strong on melons of all kinds and egg plant. Mr. Sandz showed a fine growing plant of this loaded with matured fruit. Mr. N. A. Erickson also showed very fine specimens of egg plant. A few years ago the market in Portland called for so small a supply of this vegetable that a drayload or two from The Dalles would glut the market, but the demand is gradually growing.

"The largest and finest watermelons brought into The Dalles are said to be grown without irrigation on the tops of the hills back of the city. They are very large and show no indication of any lack of a sufficient supply of available moisture while growing.

"While at The Dalles the writer had the opportunity of seeing a fine fig tree loaded with fruit, which belongs to Horticultural Commissioner Schanno. The fruit has been ripening for some time and is now on the tree in all stages of development. The quality of these figs, picked ripe from the tree, is incomparably better than that of the fresh figs brought from California when they are picked for shipment before they are fairly grown. Mr. Schanno has had this tree a number of years, but it used to kill back so badly that it did not bear. Two or three years ago he commenced giving the tree a little protection in winter, and it is now rewarding him with all the fruit which a tree of its size can be expected to bear."

**Simonton Politics in Multnomah.**

The Telegram of the 16th has this to say of the recent reorganization of the republican county committee of Multnomah:

The reorganization of the republican county and city central committee continues to excite comment. It is declared that some very smooth politics are now being played by skilled hands. The fact develops that Graham Glass, Jr., did not tender his resignation as secretary of the committee when Donald Mackay resigned as chairman, but was ousted deliberately by the committee appointed to outline the reorganization. Glass did not know what was coming, or if he did he preferred to be stripped of office rather than to seize time by the forelock, gracefully make a virtue of necessity and retire.

One of the men reporting on the reorganization stated that the reason the change in officers was made was because there had been a great deal of comment and dissatisfaction since the defeat of the organization ticket last year. Had the party won its usual victory there would have been no murmuring, but with reversals came a kick, and, naturally, the ones blamed were the managers of the campaign. As there is considerable to be attended to before the convention next year, the change in officers was attended to at this early date to prevent unpleasantness later.
