SIX WOUNDED

TEN KILLED AND

Detachment of Forty-Six Americans Attacked by Five Hundred of the Enemy.

MANILA, Oct. 18 .- Five hundred Bolo men attacked a detarbment of forty-six of the Ninth Infantry at Bangajon, on the Gandara river, leland of Samar, today, killing ten and wounding six. The remainder of the company arrived on the roene in time to prevent further slaughter, and routed the enemy, killing over 100 of them. It is believed that the enemy only retired for reinforcements. As soon as the news was received at Catbalogan, two gunboats were dispatched, General Smith going in person to the scere.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18 .- The following brief cablegram from General Chaffee, reporting the fight of the Ninth Infantry in Samar, Wednesday, was received at the war department this afternoon:

"Manila, Oct. 18 .- Corbin, Adjutant-General, Washington: Forty-six men, Company E, Ninth United States Infantry, under First Lieutenant George W. Wallace, in field, Lower Canadara, Samar, were attacked by 900 Bolomen, October 16th. Our loss ten killed, six wounded; names not received. Eightyone of the enemy left dead on the field. Enemy beaten off."

Tax Dodger Given His Just Deserts.


