SOUTHERN PACIFIC OVERLAND HELD UP

Robbers Blew Open Express Car With Dynamite, but Were Held at Bay by Messenger Charles, With a Shotgun.

EUGENE, Or., Oct. 23.—The Portland-bound California overland train on the Southern Pacific was held up by two men near Walker's, a small station fifteen miles south of here, at an early hour this morning. The robbers got away with the registered mail pouch, but nothing more. They blew open the express car with dynamite, but Express Messenger C. R. Charles refused to let them enter, and kept up a steady fire with a shotgun. It was due to Messenger Charles' nifty work that the hold-up did not net the perpetrators more booty. The passenger coaches were uncoupled at the robbers' order and left behind, the front end of the train being run ahead several miles before the desperadoes attacked the cars. Consequently the passengers slept through it all, and did not know that a hold-up had occurred.

After the robbers obtained the registered mail pouch they compelled the engineer to uncouple the locomotive and carry them a few miles. They stopped at the outskirts of Eugene and ordering the engineer to go back after his train, disappeared.

Buller and His Hellograms.
New York, Oct. 23.—According to the London correspondent of the Tribune, the king has taken great interest in the controversy about the Ladysmith hellograms, which has been carried on without intermission since Sir Redvers Buller made his unfortunate speech a fortnight ago. Mr. Brodrick was summoned to Balmoral to give His Majesty the war office view of the affair, and the return of the court to London was marked by the official announcement that Sir Redvers Buller had been relieved of the command of the First Army Corps.

No Clew of Chicago Robbers.
CHICAGO, Oct. 23.—Detectives admit that they have no possible clew from which they can trace the identity of the men who committed the robbery at the Chicago postoffice. Nothing of the slightest value has been found up to the present time, although thirty detectives and inspectors are working diligently on the case. All the known safe-breakers of prominence now at liberty are under surveillance, and secret service men and police in all the large cities are aiding the local force in its work.

A Democrat's Threat.
GEORGETOWN, Ky., Oct. 23.—The trial of Caleb Powers was resumed today. It has been discovered by counsel for the commonwealth that one of the jurors was a schoolmate of the defendant, and was in the same class with him for three years at Kentucky University.

George L. Danforth, of Louisville, was the first witness on the stand today. He was in the senate chamber when Goebel was shot, but was unable to tell whence the bullet came.

N. I. McDaniel testified that after Goebel was shot he heard Dr. Robinson, of Frankfort, say: "Let's get gone and kill Taylor and every white republican in the square."

State Senator J. B. Huff said that when Goebel was shot he was coming from the Agricultural building. He contradicted Colonel Jack Chinn, who has said that he remained at Goebel's side. Senator Huff said that when he saw Colonel Chinn he was on the steps of the State-house a good distance from Goebel.

Smuggler Breaks Jail.
PORT TOWNSEND, Oct. 23.—Frank Wilkes, alias Fred Johnson, one of the most notorious smugglers of Chinese in the country, escaped from the county jail here today. Wilkes and his smuggling craft were captured several weeks ago by the United States launch Guard. He was charged with smuggling both opium and Chinese into the United States from British Columbia. He was being held to appear before the United States grand jury on two charges. Wilkes belongs to an organized gang

of mugglers which customs and revenue officers have been on the lookout for some months, and when he was captured it was thought they had the ring-leader, and the capture of the other members would soon follow. The manner of his escape is a mystery to the authorities, but it is believed he was assisted by other members of the gang.

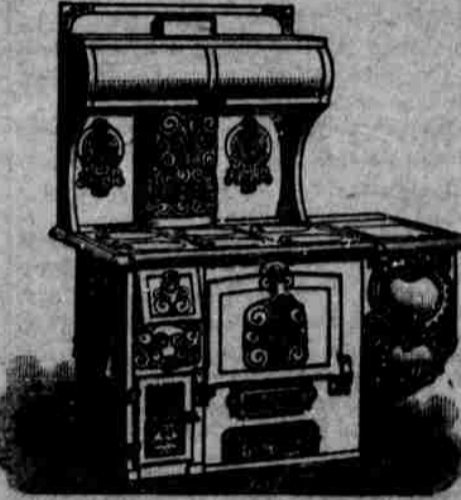
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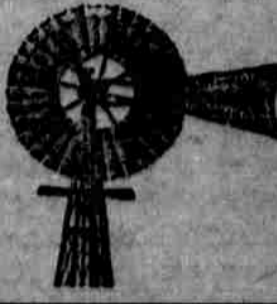
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
