FIERCE BATTLE WITH A COYOTE

Idaho Rancher Has Narrow Escape With His Life—Fatally Wounds Beast Which Tares on Him and Gives Fight.

Boise, Idaho, Oct. 24.—James Urias, who is living on E. C. Cook's place across the river, had a fight with a coyote that nearly ended in a tragedy. The animal turned upon Mr. Urias and fought desperately. Mr. Urias finally killed the brute, but not till he was almost exhausted.

Late in the afternoon, it seems, Mr. Urias went out to the barn to feed the stock. As he passed the chicken coops he noticed a large coyote skulking about. He hurried back to the house and got a double-barreled shotgun. Returning, he shot the animal, both charges taking effect in its body, but not fatally injuring the coyote.

The animal snapped and snarled, and, though he started off, it was very slowly and with most vicious looks backward at Mr. Urias. The latter wanted to kill the animal, as he was convinced it was making away with some of his chickens at least. He started after the coyote.

As the animal got to the corner of the barn it stopped, and, facing about, snarled and snapped most savagely at the oncoming farmer.

Mr. Urias rushed up to the animal, clubbing it with the butt end of the shotgun.

The coyote repeatedly tried to bite Mr. Urias, but could not. It was in an awful rage, its eyes bloodshot, foam streaming from its mouth, and almost constantly it growled and gnashed its teeth.

The most weird battle, probably, ever fought on Idaho soil was waged by the side of that barn, for fully ten minutes, when Mr. Urias finally succeeded in killing the animal. It was considered wholly strange that the coyote would fight so, but it was doubtless due to the pain from the shotgun wounds. It is considered very fortunate that Mr. Urias was not bitten.

More Soldiers Needed.

LONDON, Oct. 24.—An error committed by some of the provincial police has led to the premature leaking out of the fact that the war office contemplates the possibility of having to call out every volunteer in the country. The war office has distributed to the police officers throughout the kingdom bills ordering all reservists, military, seamen and volunteers to report themselves without delay to headquarters with the view of active service. These bills are accompanied by letter ordering that the bills be kept in a safe place until telegraphic orders to post them up are received. The police of Lancaster overlooked the letter and posted the bills, causing widespread perturbation.

Will Cost Less in South America.

NEW YORK, Oct. 24.—The first move in the direction of a settlement with the Transvaal Dynamite Company, which is a German concern, is an offer to supply explosives at thirty shillings per case under the figure ruling before the war, has just been made, says the Tribune's London correspondent. On the basis of the rate of consumption of the explosive by the Rand mines prior to the outbreak of hostilities, this would mean a saving of about \$2,250,000 a year.

Exposition Will Lose Millions.

BUFFALO, Oct. 24.—The Pan-American Exposition Company has \$804,000 cash to its credit to be devoted to paying an additional proportion of the first mortgage bonds. Already \$1,250,000 of the \$2,500,000 first mortgage bonds has been paid. The amount now due on the first mortgage bonds is \$446,000.

The exposition has nine days more. If it should clear \$50,000 a day for the nine days it would have sufficient cash to make the last payment on the first mortgage bonds. If it fails to average a net profit of \$50,000 a day there may be a default on a part of the first mortgage bond payment.

The holders of the second mortgage bonds seem to agree that no payment will be made to them. The stockholders, of course, understand that no payment will be made to them. The unpaid contractors are clamoring to get the 70 percent still due them on their claims, but thus far they have been successful. The second mortgage bonds total \$500,000. The stock represents \$2,100,000. The amount of contractors' claims is not stated exactly at present.

Dined Booker Washington.

NEW YORK, Oct. 23.—Booker T. Washington, who is attending the Yale bi-centennial celebration, was a guest of Morris F. Tyler, the treasurer of the university, at a dinner at Mr. Tyler's residence on Monday evening. Former Postmaster-General Bissell also accepted an invitation to dine with Mr. Tyler that evening and met Mr. Washington. Mr. Tyler said today that the invitations were sent and accepted about ten days before Mr. Washington dined with the president at Washington.

Stroke World's Record.

KANSAS CITY, Oct. 24.—Crescent, at the Kansas City Driving Park this afternoon, broke the world's trotting record for a mile on a half-mile course, making the distance in 2:09 1/4. The previous record was 2:10 1/4.

He described a farm home that would keep the boys and girls from going to the city. Mr. Smith commanded the close attention of his hearers at all times, and it was with general regret that the meeting was brought to a close.
