

HELP AMERICAN FARMER FIRST

The present attack on the beet sugar industry by the sugar trust is only preliminary to a more vigorous warfare which has as its object the making of a reciprocity treaty with Cuba under which the raw Cuban sugar may enter the United States free and be handled by the American Sugar Refining company, says the Spokesman-Review.

With free entry of sugar into the United States the Cuban sugar raisers know that this country would be their best market, and they will leave nothing undone to remove the barrier that now exists in the form of tariff duties. With these Cuban interests the trust will make common cause, for it wants the raw material for its refineries and it desires to get it without paying duty on it. Back of the attempt, therefore, to make a reciprocity treaty with Cuban sugar free, will be found the immense resources and influence of the sugar trust.

It is needless to say that on the other side there will be those who are determined to make a vigorous contest in behalf of the beet sugar interests which would be seriously damaged if not destroyed by the free admission of Cuban sugar at this time. At least twenty states are now raising sugar beets, and the people of those states have come to regard it as an agricultural industry of great importance. They are not disposed to see it crushed out just as it is proving a success, and especially at the behest of one of the most offensive monopolies in the land. It is generous to help the Cuban farmers, but American farmers are entitled to consideration first.
