

A TEMPEST IN A TEAPOT.

It is astonishing to see the attention devoted in the South to the entertainment of Booker Washington at dinner by the president, says the Salt Lake Tribune. The matter is made into a great issue a question of overshadowing importance. The latest number of the State at Columbia, South Carolina, has over four columns of its editorial space devoted to it, the quotations and opinions showing an anguish of mind such as might be evoked, had a sudden and great calamity overtaken the nation. The State says the treatment of the incident by the newspapers of the North shows that the Northern people do not realize the point of view of the Southern people. That certainly is true; but the enormous importance attached to it by the Southern press also shows that the point of view of Southerners is hysterical and silly. It is the more ridiculous for the South to take this view when we remember that the South voted last year with practical unanimity that colored men in the Philippines were admirable patriots and should be treated as free and equal with ourselves. In the meantime, we do not see in any of the southern papers any condemnation of the shocking and savage saying of Senator Tillman, of South Carolina, that a thousand negroes will have to be killed on account of that dinner. Such a sentiment as that is what really deserves to challenge the attention of the South, which ought to condemn Tillman in most scathing terms for thus inciting a pitiless war upon blacks who are innocent parties, who had nothing to do with this bone of contention. Booker Washington had been entertained by great officials in Europe, and even by Queen Victoria; he is a citizen of this country, doing a mighty work for whites and blacks alike. The idea of objecting to the president's entertainment of him is preposterous; it is a relic of ignorant and bigoted provincialism which the Southern people must outgrow. By the way, suppose Aguinaldo should come to this country and be entertained by the president; would the South make objection? If not, why not? But is there any just comparison of Aguinaldo with Booker Washington, in character, works or patriotism? Suppose the governor of South Carolina, Georgia, or Alabama, should invite Aguinaldo to dinner, would the South's heavens be rent? Those states voted in effect for Aguinaldo, and certainly their governors should not be above eating with him. But if they would eat with him, why should they not eat with Washington, an out-of-sight better man?

Justice Brewer, of the United States supreme court, recently, in a speech delivered at Yale college, made the statement that he could see no solution of the trust problem. The present movement toward consolidation and centralization was but a natural evolution that legislation against trusts could not stop. He could suggest but one thing, namely, proper public sentiment formed under the leadership of men of brains and education. Opinions such as these will have suggested themselves to every man of candor and intelligence who has given the subject careful investigation. Legislation sufficiently far-reaching to stop all combinations of capital known as trusts would be revolutionary and productive of infinitely more harm than good. Every intelligent man knows that there are good trusts as well as bad ones. The best, therefore, that intelligent legislation can hope to accomplish is the restriction or suppression of those that experience proves to be inimical to the interests of the masses of the people.

Even here it is much easier to suggest what ought to be done than to suggest how it can be done. Back of all the anti-trust agitation is the solid fact that the country was never in a more prosperous condition, nor labor more plentiful or better rewarded than it is today. With less than half a dozen of the more obnoxious trusts shorn of their power to do mischief we might defy the radicals anti-trust agitators to point out any material respect in which the remaining combinations are proving injurious to the masses.
