

MR. CORBETT'S DONATION

Subscribes One-tenth of the Entire Amount.

PORTLAND, Nov. 3.—H. W. Corbett set the ball rolling for the Lewis and Clark Centennial Saturday afternoon with a subscription of \$30,000.

This is one-tenth of the entire amount that is to be subscribed by the stockholders of the corporation. Mr. Corbett made this announcement at the meeting of the members of the committees appointed by the chamber of commerce, board of trade and Manufacturers' Association, to co-operate with the subscription committee of the incorporators, of which Mr. Corbett is chairman. It was the unanimous opinion of the business men present that \$300,000 could be raised to make the Lewis and Clark celebration a success, and further, that the generous subscription of Mr. Corbett did much to assure the raising of the amount and the ultimate success of the exposition project.

"I am willing to give one-tenth of the \$300,000 that has been named as the amount to be raised by the stockholders of the corporation, which is to direct the Lewis and Clark Centennial," said Chairman Corbett, in making his announcement. "I have lived here fifty years, and I believe that I can afford to give that much for this exposition that will be a benefit to this country, even if I do not get a cent back. I do not expect to take my money with me to my grave. I wish it to do all the good it can while I am here."

Collision at Rosalia.

ROSALIA, Wash., Nov. 2.—A rear end collision of freight trains occurred in front of the depot here today. Two engines were badly smashed, two freight cars and a caboose were wrecked, a corner of the depot was crashed into and the building fired. One tramp was slightly hurt. A wrecking train is now at work and the track will be cleared sometime tomorrow. No blame is attached to the train crew, as they were apparently unable to stop their heavily loaded battering ram.

Shot His Sister.

KALISPELL, Mont., Nov. 2.—Glen Jaqueth, the 14 year old son of ex-Representative Jaqueth of this city, accidentally shot and killed his little sister, 18 months old, this evening. The boy was experimenting with a new shotgun when it was accidentally discharged, the shot entering the back of the child who was in an adjoining room twenty feet away. The wound resulted in death an hour later.

THE CAMPAIGN IN OHIO

Republicans Are Confident of Success—No Third Party of Any Consequence in this Years Contest.

CINCINNATI, Nov. 2.—On account of the death of President McKinley, the Ohio campaign began at a much later date than usual. The republicans held their opening meeting October 19th, and had eleven days of campaigning. The democrats opened their campaign October 23d, and had only eight days. For this reason there will be some meetings next Monday, notably the meeting to be addressed by Senator Hanna at Elyria. Senator Hanna has been speaking several times each day since the republican opening, and Governor Nash has done likewise. During the past week Senator Foraker, who is a candidate for re-election, has traveled by special trains and addressed the people along his route between the hours of his afternoon and evening rallies. In addition to the state candidates, many speakers from other states, including Governor Gear, of Oregon; Speaker Henderson and several congressmen, have been here for the republicans.

The contest this year is squarely between the republicans and democrats. There is no third party of any such consequence as two years ago, when Mayor Sam Jones, of Toledo, a non-partisan candidate, received 106,230 votes for governor, more than one-fourth the vote cast for Governor Nash, republican, and almost one-third the vote for John R. McLean, the democratic gubernatorial candidate. Jones then carried the two large counties of Cuyahoga and Lucas, in which Cleveland and Toledo are located. The vote of all the minor parties, including the prohibitionists, socialists and reformers, this year will not aggregate 20,000 out of a total vote of probably 900,000.

Lining Up For Next Tuesday.

New York, Nov. 3.—After a meeting Saturday of the Tammany hall executive committee Secretary Thomas F. Smith announced that according to the reports of the leaders of the various districts in Manhattan and the Bronx, Edward M.

Shepard, democratic candidate for mayor, would have a majority of 47,323. The majority in Greater New York is placed at more than 50,000.

Robert O. Morris, chairman of the republican county committee, tonight estimates the majority for Seth Low and the other fusion candidates at 29,500 in Manhattan and the Bronx and 70,000 in Greater New York.

Chairman George W. Dunn of the republican state committee, issued a statement in which he claims that the republicans will elect ninety out of the 115 assemblymen to be elected in the state.

Both sides in the contest in Greater New York practically closed their campaigns Saturday night as far as speaking is concerned. Mr. Shepard and Mr. Low made their last speeches and the fusionists have announced no more meetings. The democrats, however, had several meetings scheduled for Sunday night. Saturday night immense meetings were held by both sides all over Greater New York.

Shots at Clatskanie.

CLATSKANIE, Nov. 3.—Perry C. French, a single man about 23 years of age, committed suicide Saturday evening by sending a bullet through his brain. He had recently come West from Lone Tree, Mo., and for the past three or four days was stopping with the family of an old acquaintance, Sanford Carver. He seemed in rather unusually good spirits Saturday, and about 7 p. m. went up stairs to his room, from where a shot was heard in less than three minutes, followed by a groan. When found he was unconscious and died in about 15 minutes. A note was found with his pocketbook in his hat near by, directing that his body be sent to his father, L. W. French, Lone Tree, Mo.; that his money, about \$12, be used as far as it would go and his father would pay the balance. The note directed other arrangements for his funeral, naming pall bearers, clergyman, etc., and closed by bidding all good-bye and stating that life was not worth living any longer for him.

Attempt to Kill Emperor.

PEKIN, Nov. 3.—While the emperor dowager was embarking to cross the river today before entering Ho-nan an assassin attempted to murder her and killed an attendant with a spear before he was cut down. The court has left Ho-nan, enroute to Pekin.
