## TROOPS FOR SOUTH AFRICA

Soldiers in India Will Be Sent to the Transvaal.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—Commenting upon the South African military situation, the London correspondent of the Tribune says: It is understood to be the intention of the war office to send 5000 more mounted men out to South Africa during the next six weeks. There are only about 7000 mounted men at home, so that the military authorities are faced with the problem of training soldiers minus the necessary accompaniment of cavalry arms. To meet this obvious failing, it is probable that several composite regiments of yeomanry will be voluntarily embodied for home service. A move will soon be made to bring home from South Africa the men who have served over two years in the war, and their places may be taken by the British cavalry division of seven regiments now in India. After the conclusion of hostilities it is expected that a permanent garrison at the cape will consist of 50,000 men.

### German Barbarity.

NEW YORK, Nov. 1.—A dispatch from Berlin to the London Times and New York Times quotes an article in the Vossische Zeitung referring to the execution of two Stuttgart journalists for labeling the German troops in China, The Vossische Zeitung says:

"There is no question of barbarity in connection with the conduct of the campaign. There is no ground for the supposition that the troops of other nations were more humane in their conduct than those of Germany. At the same time it remains open to question whether it was necessary, as General Lessele, thinks, to resort in so many cases to the punishment of binding our men to stakes."

### Will Rescue Miss Stone.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—According to the Vienna Politische Correspondenz, quoted by the correspondent of the London Times and the New York Times in the Austrian capital, a well-known Macedonian brigand has been instructed to obtain information as to whether Miss Ellen M. Stone is still alive. Two other brigands, well acquainted with the country, have been commissioned by United States Consul-General Dickinson to try to get in touch with the missionary's captors. The perfect of the Sofia police have also sent two messengers. Miss Stone's release is again represented as being imminent.

### Underground Fire at Stevenson.

STEVENSON, Wash., Nov. 4.—The residents of this place were thrown into great excitement this morning when J. T. Totton and W. Udill reported that they had discovered a coal deposit on fire within a quarter of a mile of the town. The greater part of the population turned out to see what was the matter. A subterranean fire is burning in a crevice in the rocks with a sulphurous smell. So hot is the fire that it was difficult to make any headway at excavation. It is a wonder to the people here and it is thought to be coal or gas on fire. In the near vicinity of the fire are small veins of coal running back from the Columbia river. Some years ago a coal prospector sunk a shaft some fifty, but abandoned it. Recently coal prospectors were operating in the neighborhood and declared there was excellent indication of coal and gas. They bonded much of the property in the immediate neighborhood.

### Election at Baker City.

BAKER CITY, Or., Nov. 4.—The municipal election of city officers today was quiet. Party lines were ignored. Municipal ownership was the only issue. The present council has gone on record several times within the past year on the matter of municipal ownership, and as all the old members were up for reelection, an effort was made in some of the wards to defeat them. In every ward where there was a contest the old members were successful. The following were elected:

Recorder and police judge, W. H. Bently; city treasurer, S. George Foster; councilmen, first ward, H. S. Bowen; second ward, Dr. J. P. Hayes; third ward, H. E. Courtney; fourth ward, Byron Gale and Louis Orabill.

### Considered on Trial.

SEATTLE, Nov. 4.—The trial of John Considine, charged with the murder of Chief of Police Will Meredith, began in the superior court this morning before Judge Emory. The attorneys for the defendant renewed their motion for a continuance, which was again denied. The work of impeaching a jury was at once commenced.

The case of Tom Considine, jointly accused with his brother, John, has not been set for trial.

### A Wild Deer.

M'INNIVILLE, Or., Nov. 4.—A live deer appeared on the college campus this morning. When the students began to assemble for class work the

animal, which was about a 3-year-old doe, was complacently browsing on the lawn between the main building and the athletic field.

About twenty-five boys undertook to surround the deer, thinking they could capture it with a lasso, but the agile creature easily cleared the eight-foot board fence which encircles the athletic field, and made for the mountains, about ten miles distant. Although the mountains near McMinnville are well stocked with deer, it is decidedly unusual for one to appear in the heart of civilization. It was presumably run out of the hills by hounds.

### Big Colorado Mining Deal.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Nov. 4.—The control of the Elkton Consolidated Gold Mining Company on the property of which a remarkably rich strike was made recently, has passed into the hands of Eastern capitalists for a consideration based on a valuation of \$6,875,000 for the entire capitalization. The names of the buyers are withheld for the present by E. M. Delavergne, their local agent, himself a prominent stockholder.

The deal is perhaps the largest involving Colorado mining property since Stratton's Independence was sold in April, 1899, for \$10,000,000. In local mining circles it is thought that the purchasers are New York capitalists, who represent Webster, Belt & Co., of London, who have sought to buy the mine.

### To Take Moving Pictures.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 4.—Interest in the coming battle between the giants of the prize-ring is so great that the Edison Kinetoscope Company, of New York, is going to take moving pictures of the contest, to be produced in all the big Eastern cities. At a meeting between the representatives of the pugilists, the Twentieth Century Athletic Club, and a member of the Edison Company, all the arrangements were perfected. Lights aggregating 150,000 candle-power will be placed over the ring, and machines with 20,000 feet of film will be stationed around the arena to catch every movement, blow, feint and guard of the men.

### Rice Will Case Again on Trial.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—After delays covering more than a year, the famous Rice will case came up for trial today before Surrogate Fitzgerald. The will is that made in 1896 by Millionaire William Marsh Rice, for whose death Lawyer Albert Patrick and Valet Jones are held in custody.
