BOERS MUST BE "SMASHED"

Too Much Sentimental Humbug About the War in Africa.

New York, Nov. 19.—Mail advices from Natal to the London Times and New York Times says the problem in South Africa is a complicated one and cannot be grasped by reading the newspapers. The correspondent says the British must be made to understand that they have to deal with a peculiar people, whose very elementary education has been directed by their unscrupulous and ambitious leaders to imbuing them with the belief that, as the chosen of God, they are called to the dominion of South Africa. They are taught that the amalekites Britisher is to be driven into the sea, leaving them the blacks as their hewers of wood and drawers of water, as in the days of the great trek.

In Natal, says the correspondent, the people are either thoroughly loyal or thorough rebels, but in Cape Colony thousands of Afrikaners are on the fence. There has been too much sentimental humbug, declares the correspondent. He insists that the inhabitants must be thoroughly "smashed," and made to feel they are "smashed," for the sake of the future of South Africa. Then will be the time for the British to be generous. After peace comes the burghers can be handled easily, if the scales of justice are evenly held.

One of Earliest Yamhill Pioneers. **SHERIDAN, Nov. 19.**—Grandma Daugherty, whose funeral was held at Williams Wednesday, was a pioneer of 1833.

She was one of the earliest residents of Yamhill county.

At that time Yamhill county was little less than a wilderness, and settlers were few and far between. Oregon City was but a village, with one small store. The settlers did most, if not all, their trading at Vancouver, Wash., and Mr. Daugherty made regular trips to that place to buy provisions. In 1867 they sold their farm and moved to an old mill site near old Fort Yamhill, where Mr. Daugherty engaged in the milling business for twenty years. Upon retiring from active business life the old couple moved to Williams, where they have since resided. She was the mother of thirteen children, eleven of whom survive her. Her husband survives her, aged 83.

czar's Grasp on the Orient.

New York, Nov. 19.—A dispatch to the Tribune from London says: The special correspondent of the Daily News in Vladivostok has discovered that there is no English consul there. So he called upon the American representative, Theodore Greener, whose position is that of commercial agent for the United States. Mr. Greener informed him that besides America, France, Germany, Holland and Japan were commercially represented. Americans and Germans, he went on to say, had most of the trade.

"No man," writes the correspondent, "can come through Siberia to such a place as Vladivostok and give thought to what Russia has done in a generation without being amazed. England may criticize Russian manners and growl at Russian diplomacy and wonder how people can live under an autocratic government, but Russia has laid hold of the East."

Mistake Caused Tacoma Failure. **TACOMA, Nov. 19.**—The Metropolitan Bank failed today as a result of a run

which started over a misunderstanding with regard to a suit filed against a defunct bank of similar name. The deposits amount to \$500,000. Dwight Phelps has been appointed receiver.

The officers of the Metropolitan, which is a successor to the old Metropolitan Savings Bank, are: P. D. Caesar, president; T. W. Enos, vice-president, and O. B. Selvig, cashier. The bank was capitalized at \$500,000.

Pacific Cable to Be Laid by Englishmen

LONDON, Nov. 19.—The Commercial Pacific Cable Company, recently organized in New York to lay a cable from San Francisco to the Philippines, has awarded the contract for the manufacture and laying of the first section from San Francisco to Honolulu to an English company, which guarantees to complete it in ten months. The contract price is nearly \$1,000,000.

Restored to Civil Service.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—President Roosevelt has issued an order amending the civil service regulations so as to return to the civil service a number of civilian places in the war department excepted by executive order on May 29, 1899. Today's order is at the request of Secretary Root, and it affects about 1800 people in the quartermaster's, medical, engineer and engineer-at-large departments.

Endowment Bank, E. of F.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Nov. 18.—Charles F. S. Neal, president of the Endowment Bank, Knights of Pythias, has sent out the statement of the board of control for the quarter ending October 1st. It shows a total membership of 59,509, with insurance amounting to \$196,150,000. The net loss of members during the quarter was 699.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 19.—Thomas H. Williams, Jr., president of the new California Jockey Club, is about to try an experiment in preparing horses for the track. The well-known horseman is a believer in the theory that horses should not be put on the track until they have reached their maturity. He believes that two-year-olds are neither strong nor wise enough to do themselves justice.

Mr. Williams intends buying a number of yearlings and colts and sending them to Oregon. It is his intention to allow the horses to browse on the bunchgrass and gain strength roaming over the country. He will not permit them to grow wild nor will he have them trained. He will simply have them ridden from time to time for the purpose of accustoming them to the work they will have to do on the track, where, he is confident, they will demonstrate the correctness of his theory.

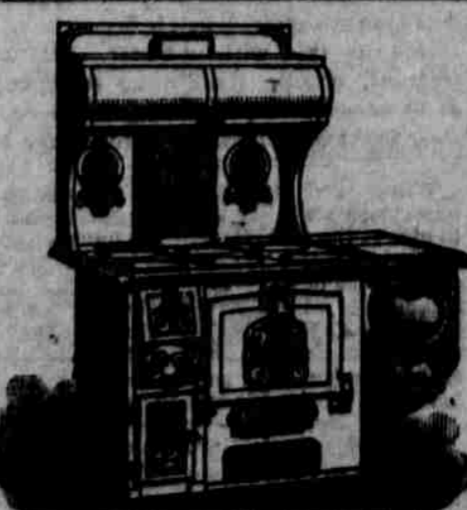
