HOPE TO CURE CONSUMPTION

Denver Business Men Establish an Outdoor Colony.

DENVER, Nov. 20.—The Rocky Mountain Industrial Sanitarium organized by Denver professional and business men last spring, is now in successful operation. On a 10 acre tract five miles from Denver fifteen or twenty patients in the early stages of consumption are under the plans of the promoters virtually taking care of themselves. The rules of the institution compel a continuous outdoor life to be maintained summer and winter. Each patient is provided with a roomy tent, plenty of warm clothing and blankets a small stove to be used only in extremely cold weather. Experience has proved that with proper food and clothing and a life in the open air and sunshine artificial heat is unnecessary and becomes absolutely unbearable to the patients, who without exception are gaining rapidly.

The hope of the physicians and others back of the enterprise is to form a great colony of all consumptives who come to Denver, and thus take them off the streets of the city, and out of the hotels and boarding-houses, where they could never recover, and where they are a constant menace to the public health. While no one is allowed by the articles of incorporation to profit by the enterprise, the institution must be self-supporting. The co-operative idea has already been put in force, for many of the patients are supporting themselves wholly or in part by doing the work on the premises.

Next spring the ground will be platted

and everything needed at the sanitarium will be raised and sold to the commissary department at regular prices. It is also the purpose to make the place so attractive that tubercular patients of some means will be glad to avail themselves of its advantages and contribute money instead of labor.

The sanitarium auxiliary, composed of young women has established branches in many Eastern cities, where money is being raised for the equipment of tents and the building of airy cottages. Margaret S. Dunne, who received high commendation for her work in army hospitals, during the Spanish war, has been secured as superintendent.

Admiral Schley Declines.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., Nov. 20.—Following the report that the court of inquiry would cost Admiral Schley \$20,000, the Knoxville Sentinel on November 18th sent him a dispatch asking him if he consent to public subscription to pay the cost of the same. Today the Sentinel received a personal letter from Admiral Schley, the purport of which was that he cannot accept the offer. He says the report as to the cost is a mistake, as the amount is not as great as reported. He suggests that the matter is "too delicate to discuss," and trusts that his friends will "appreciate his position and respect it."

New-Fashioned Green Goods Game.

NEW YORK, Nov. 20.—According to the Journal and Advertiser, the best men in the United States Secret Service and the cleverest inspectors in the postoffice department are at present working in the attempt to discover the details of a new green goods scheme, which was worked until a week ago from Manhattan, and which is at present being operated from Jersey City and Chicago. The victims are second, third and fourth-class postmasters, who do not dare complain to

the authorities. It is known that since the first of July more than 1000 postmasters have been swindled out of sums ranging from \$250 to \$1000.

The principle of the game is the same as that of the old-fashioned green goods game. But in the 20th century bunco game only postmasters are invited and they are urged to purchase instead of money, postage stamps from "the undestroyed plates of the government," plates and stamps which, of course, are not in existence. The postmasters are lured to this city by samples which are sent by mail. These goods are genuine stamps and not counterfeit stamps. When the victim reaches the city all of the old-fashioned games of substitution are practiced.

Germans Waking Up.

NEW YORK, Nov. 20.—Germany is not going to sit down quietly under the loss of its commerce, says the Tribune's London correspondent. The merchants of the great urban district of the Rhine have determined to leave no stone unturned to meet American competition. The first step they have decided upon is the canalization of the Moselle and Saumur, by which means they hope to lessen the cost of transport to the coast. The scheme is to cost 70,000,000 marks and will take a few years to complete.

Courts Not Competent.

THE HAGUE, Nov. 20.—The administrative council of the court of arbitration decided today that it was incompetent to consider the Boer appeal for intervention in the war in South Africa.
