## THE TREATY IS APPROVED

But Some Senators Are Not in Entire Accord With It.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.—The senate committee on Foreign Relations today voted to report favorably the new Hay-Pauncefote treaty, providing for the construction of an isthmian canal. The committee was in session nearly two hours and went over in detail the provisions of the convention. No votes were cast against it, but it was criticized very sharply by Senators Money and Bacon, who found in it many of the objections which they urged against the old treaty.

They took especial exception to the provision continuing in force the neutrality provision of the Clayton-Bulwer treaty, and also made objection to the clause specifically authorizing the United States to police the canal as placing a limitation upon the power of this country to absolutely control it. The contention was made that the effect of the treaty as sent to the senate would be to deprive the United States of control of the canal in case of war. Especial attention was called to the provision in the preamble of the impending treaty reserving article eight of the Clayton-Bulwer treaty from the repeal provision of the new treaty. The portion of this article of the old treaty to which especial objection was made reads as follows:

"In granting, however, their joint protection to any such canal or railroads as are by this article specified, it is always understood by the United States and Great Britain that the parties constructing or owning shall impose no other charges or conditions of traffic thereupon than the aforesaid governments shall approve of as just and equitable; and that the same canals or railroads, being open to the citizens and subjects of the United States and Great Britain on equal terms, shall also be open on like terms to the citizens and subjects of every other state which is willing to grant thereto such protection as the United States and Great Britain engage to afford."

Senators Money and Bacon did not go to the extent of voting against the report of the treaty, and they acknowledge they are anxious to see it ratified because of their great desire to have the canal built. Still they insisted that the treaty as it now stands is very objectionable in case of the contingency of war.

Senator Frye presided over the meeting and he asked Senator Lodge to report the treaty to the senate on Monday next in case there should be an executive session on that day.

It also was the sense of the committee that the consideration of the treaty should be pressed as speedily as possible in the senate, some senators expressing the hope that action might be secured before the adjournment for the holidays. The committee also voted to recommend that the injunction of secrecy be removed from the treaty.

### Another "Modern" Bible.

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—A new bible, authorized by the late general convention in San Francisco, to be read in all Episcopal churches in the United States, has been in process of completion by the committee on marginal readings which has sat at the Episcopal General Seminary in this city since last Tuesday, and will conclude its work tomorrow (Saturday), says the Times. It was stated that an English firm had undertaken the publication of this bible without expense to the committee.

This new bible is to consist of the text and renderings of the King James version, the renderings of the English revision and the renderings of the recent American revision. The renderings of the Episcopal commission are ordered to be printed in an appendix for preservation.

The late convention, while it praised the scholarship of its commission, did not place their work upon the same level as that of revisers who had included lay scholars and who had spent many more years at the work, besides being far larger in numbers. The new bible insures the very latest renderings, although the reading of them is permissive only, not obligatory.

### Americans' Big Schemes Denounced.

LONDON, Dec. 6.—The Times, in its financial article this morning, discusses the question of credit relations between the United States and Europe. The Times regards the time as still distant when the United States will become a great banker nation, and compliments Mr. Gage as the best secretary of the treasury for many years past. The paper says it remains to be seen whether all the big American schemes which European capitalists are directly or indirectly financing at the present moment will prove as profitable as sanguine people expect.

"We think that during the last year American energy and optimism have to some extent outrun discretion," says the Times, "and some of the best qualified judges in the United States seem to agree with us."

### Anarchists Cheer Custigan's Name.

CHICAGO, Dec. 6.—President McKinley's assassin was cheered publicly in Chicago last night. A challenge from the platform that anarchists dared not condemn the crime of Buffalo, was met with a vigorous "You're a liar." Abraham Isaak, the recognized leader of the "reds" in this city and editor of

Free Society, declared openly he could not condemn the assassin's act. He said that as to personal merit he took a second place to Custigan. The confession of Isaak was accompanied by a scene of intense excitement. It was the climax of the debate on "Socialism or Anarchy," and came when the crowd of over 1700 had been aroused thoroughly by wild oratorical denunciation.

"Hurrah for Custigan," shouted a man in the gallery, swinging his hat above his head.

Hisses, jeers, yells of approval and cat calls came from all parts of the house. The crowd rose to its feet and riot was only averted by the prompt action of the chairman.

### Declares It is a Lie.

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—The Paris correspondent of the London Times and New York Times quotes a dispatch from The Hague correspondent of the Temps in regard to a serious quarrel between Queen Wilhelmina and her husband, Prince Henry of the Netherlands. The Temps vouchers for the correspondent as a contributor who has the reputation of sending accurate information.

The correspondent says the malicious rumors in regard to the Queen and Prince Henry are the fabrications of a cheap socialist paper in Holland. He adds:
