

## WILL REFUND ON LAND GRANT SALES

**\$1.25 PER ACRE TO BE RETURNED RAILROAD LAND PURCHASERS.**

(Chronicle's Washington Bureau.)  
 WASHINGTON, April 7.—Representative Sinnott has been notified by the commissioner of the general land office that refund of \$1.25 per acre will be made to purchasers who paid \$2.50 per acre for land in even numbered sections, involved in the primary limits of the general route of the Northern Pacific railroad from Wallula Junction, Washington to Portland, Oregon, forfeited by act of congress in 1890. Two dollars and fifty cents per acre was charged instead of the regular price of \$1.25 on the theory that the building of the railroad would enhance the value of the land.

The road was not built and the supreme court of the United States, in 1919, decided that a refund should be made to purchasers of land in odd sections. The commissioner ruled that this decision of the supreme court did not cover the even sections, but the secretary of the interior has recently held that the refund should likewise apply to the even sections as well as to the odd.

The lands involved are embraced in a strip forty miles wide on each side of the proposed line of the Northern Pacific along the Columbia river from Wallula Junction, Washington, to Portland, Oregon, which was forfeited on account of the failure of the railroad company to construct the road.

Applicants will have until December 11, 1921 to file applications for repayment and may obtain application blanks by writing to Representative Sinnott.
