20 Hoboes Rounded Up—Following information that the local freight depot had been broken into some time Saturday night and a quantity of box candy, consigned to local merchants, stolen, Sheriff Chrisman and the local police this morning rounded up 20 hoboes in an effort to get some clue to the identity of the robbers. None of the men arrested could be connected with the robbery of the freight house and all were released this afternoon, with instructions to "keep moving." One of the men arrested told Chrisman that a party of negroes had "pulled the job" Saturday night.

Work on Paving Plant Rushed—Work is being rushed upon the paving plant being constructed near Mosier by the A. D. Kern company, in anticipation of early laying of "hot stuff" on the Columbia river highway between the gravel pits, near Mosier, and Hood River. Upon the starting of paving operations the contract let to the A. D. Kern company calls for the highway being closed during working hours. This will probably mean that the road will be closed between 8 o'clock in the morning and 5 o'clock in the evening. The contract specifies, however, that travel must be allowed during the noon hour and after working hours.

Y. W. C. A. Raises \$4,303—With a total of \$4,303 actually in hand, the finance campaign of the local Y. W. C. A. closed Saturday night. The goal set in the campaign was \$5000, necessary to pay operating expenses of a Y. W. C. A. in this city for another year. It is expected that several subscribers not yet heard from will contribute enough to raise the present total to \$4,500. A subscription of \$200, the amount made by the Amity club at its public market last week, is considered doubly valued because of the fact that the club members worked during all of last week and donated much of the material which was sold in the market. A shoe shining stand maintained by the club alone brought in \$15. No more soliciting teams will be sent out, according to Miss Helen Fair, Y. W. C. A. secretary.

Navy Wants Men—The United States navy is again campaigning for young men between the ages of 18 and 35 years to join the service, according to J. A. Smolick, chief torpedoman of the U. S. submarine service, who visited in this city Saturday and Sunday. The Crandall Undertaking company has charge of arrangements. No funeral services will be held here. The body to be taken directly to the
