and the cost to the consumers soars. By the present method of wheat selling, the farmers get very little for their work and risk and investment. The ultimate consumers are forced to pay top heavy prices for the produce.

The actual producer, then, does not get the high price paid by the ultimate consumer. The men who have no part in production by successive juggling of a crop which they own on paper benefit greatly.

Middlemen, let us qualify this by the adjective illegitimate, who do no service in growing or marketing the wheat, seize the profit while the producer gets less profit than is rightfully due based on service performed and the ultimate consumer pays more than he should, based on the units of utility in the product which he must have to live.

Government figures show that the middlemen are taking 21 percent profit for sitting in office chairs and buying fictitious farm produce and selling it to other speculators.
