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WEED OUT PARASITES

The business of the republican administration at Washington is to bring the United States back to a state of normalcy. It is a big task and to accomplish it many things not be done

One of the weapons with which the administration is to fight abnormal conditions is the tariff. A tariff barrier is to be erected against cutside goods. This will in operaing along the line of supply and demand.

The Young emergency tariff now in process of passing congress provides for a virtual embargo against foreign agricultural products. It is now languishing.

and the cost to the consumers soars. By the present method of wheat selling, the farmers get very little for their work and risk and investment. The ultimate consumers are forced to pay top heavy prices for the produce.

The actual producer, then, does not get the high price paid by the ultimate consumer. The men who have no part in production by successive juggling of a crop which they own on paper benefit greatly. They take the profit. They plant no blade of wheat. They tend no blade of wheat. They don't even further the process of distribution, economically.

Middlemen, let us qualify this by the adjective illegitimate, who do no service in growing or marketing the wheat, seize the profit while the producer gets less profit than is rightfully due based on service performed and the ultimate consumer pays more than he should, based op the units of utility in the product

which he must have to live. Government figures show that the middlemen are taking 21 percent profit for sitting in office chairs and buying fictitious farm produce and selling it to other speculators. What applies to wheat applies to

all products in greater or smaller degrees.

Until these greedy speculators are knocked out, tariff will do little towards bringing back normalcy.
