

NEWS NOTES

Fordyce-Froth License — A marriage license was issued this morning to Isaac N. Fordyce, of Antelope, and Miss Lenor Law Froth of Pendleton.

To Address Men's Club—Rev. Otis H. Holmes, pastor of the Congregational church of Walla Walla is in The Dalles today. He will address the meeting of the Men's club of the local Congregational church this evening.

Parent-Teachers' Meeting—Mrs. W. C. Hayhurst, state president of the Parent-Teacher association, will be in The Dalles tomorrow for the purpose of addressing a meeting at the local high school. The organization of a general city association will be considered. The meeting will be called promptly at 3 o'clock tomorrow afternoon, in the high school auditorium.

Pythians Vote Relief — The Rev. Carl C. Walker presented the appeal of the China Famine Relief before the Knights of Pythias at their regular meeting last Monday evening and the Knights appointed Otis E. Bays to act as their representative on the central committee for pushing the relief work in The Dalles. They also voted \$25.00 to be paid out in this humanitarian work, which will save at least eight lives in China.

Auto Camp, One of the Finest—The auto camp site chosen by The Dalles when beautified according to plan will be one of the finest in the Northwest," declared E. E. McClaran, Portland architect who is in the city today. Mr. McClaran is an authority on parks, having designed the Wyeth park. He is well known here as the designer of the local Elks' temple. The architect is in the city now to submit plans for the civic auditorium.

Pageant Programs to be Compiled—A 16-page program, outlining the prologue of the pageant and suitable for use as a souvenir for The Dalles people to send to their eastern friends, is being prepared, under the direction of H. L. Law. Present tentative plans are to make the historic pageant an annual event, advertised all over the Pacific coast, and programs sent by people of The Dalles to friends are expected to play a large part in advertising the pageant. It is expected that 10,000 copies of the program will be printed.

Y. W. C. A. Luncheon Tomorrow—A good program has been arranged for tomorrow's Community luncheon at the Y. W. C. A. rooms at 12 o'clock. Mayor P. J. Stadelman will give a short address. Mrs. Joseph Stadelman will discuss Community Service as related to child welfare. Hallie Rice will talk on the commercial value to the city of an annual pageant. A male quartet will sing and several extemporaneous talks will be given. L. S. Pilcher will direct several songs with Mrs. Pilcher at the piano.

In Interest of Famine Relief—The Rev. Carroll C. Roberts and The Rev. Carl C. Walker were taken by A. H. Fligg in his car to visit the schools of the county Tuesday in the interests of the Near East and China Famine Relief. They were able to visit Upper Five Mile, Upper Eight Mile, Endersby, Boyd and Lower Five Mile. Pleasant Ridge school was closed. A splendid response was met with in each school visited. Today The Rev. Roberts speaks in The Dalles public schools and high school.

Chamber Holds Short Meeting — C. H. Foster, field agent of the Pacific Coast Rescue and Protective society, yesterday evening appeared before the board of directors of The Dalles-Wasco County Chamber, of Commerce and asked that the directors endorse a proposition whereby the local county court would be asked to set aside a stated sum annually for the support of the society's home in Portland. H. S. Rice was appointed as a committee of one to investigate the proposal and take any action necessary. Discussion of the progress of work in the new city park was indulged in, following which the directors adjourned.

Pageant Committee Perfects Plans —The Historical pageant committee met yesterday to perfect further plans for the pageant which is to be held May 27. Mrs. Nettie Smith and Mrs. George Groble were appointed to plan for the state representations from among the school girls. Plans for song sheets were made. The following songs were decided upon for Community practice to be used in the pageant, "America the Beautiful," "Battle Hymn of the Republic," "Star Spangled Banner," and "The Long, Long Trail." Orchestra and piano accompaniments will be used. Rehearsals of the various groups will start Friday.

Dance Ordinance Effective — The new city dance hall ordinance, passed by the city council two months ago without an emergency clause, is now effective, Miss Celia Gavin, city attorney, announced this morning. Under the ruling of the new ordinance all persons giving a dance in a public hall must pay a license fee of three dollars for each dance regardless of whether the dance is public, private or fraternal. This sum will be used, in the case of public dances, to hire a chaperone, who will supervise the conduct of the dancers. No boys or girls under 18 years of age will be allowed to attend public dances, unless accompanied by a parent or legal guardian.

Community Sing Tonight—The big Community Sing at the Vogt school this evening will open with the men's chorus at 7:30. The general chorus for men and women will practice at 8 o'clock and the song leaders' class will follow. Another rehearsal will be held Friday evening at the Vogt school. Mr. and Mrs. L. S. Pilcher will leave for Everett, Wash., the first of the week. They have done some very efficient work in Community song training since coming to the city. Miss Sophie Messenger and Mrs. Carlton P. Williams, chairman of the Community Service music committee, will direct the community sings and the pageant songs after Mr. and Mrs. Pilcher leave.

Mrs. John Summer Dies — Mrs. John Summer, for 14 years a resident of The Dalles, died yesterday at the family home in Bend, following an extended illness. She is survived by four children, Floyd, Mary Helen and Geneva, all of Bend; her husband, John G. Summer, also of that city; her father, S. B. Nickelson of The Dalles; four brothers, Charley, Sim and Sam of The Dalles and William of Tygh Valley; three sisters, Mrs. C. H. Gilpin and Mrs. C. L. Johns of The Dalles and Mrs. E. J. Taylor of Charleroi, Pa. Funeral services will be held Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the Burget-Mogan company's funeral home. Burial will be in Odd Fellows' cemetery.

Local Churches Effect Council — A strong nucleus for a central council of the Protestant churches of The Dalles was authorized last night, at a special meeting held in the Methodist church, when the United Brethren, Methodist and Baptist churches voted through their representatives to effect such a body. Officially appointed representatives from the Christian church were present to report back to their communities for further action. A special committee was appointed to arrange for an article in the constitution allowing individual representations on the part of those who are unable because of church policy to enter the council as units. The next meeting will be held Tuesday evening, May 17, when permanent officers will be elected. The council will function along four lines, evangelism, community service, and publicity.

Disputed Building Burns — Fire early this morning completely destroyed a small frame building a short distance across the Fourth street bridge. No one was living in the building. The origin of the fire is not known. The ownership of the building has long been a matter of dispute between the city and Mrs. Mary K. Britten. The city claims that the building was built by a "squatter," upon city property. Mrs. Britten, on the other hand, contends that she purchased the property from a man who received it in a grant from the old Methodist mission. At last night's city council meeting, City Engineer P. W. Marx was instructed to make a survey of the property in dispute for use by the city attorney in investigating the justness of Mrs. Britten's claims. The destruction of the building by fire will probably greatly complicate any possible court action which may be started by the city. Miss Celia Gavin, city attorney, said today.

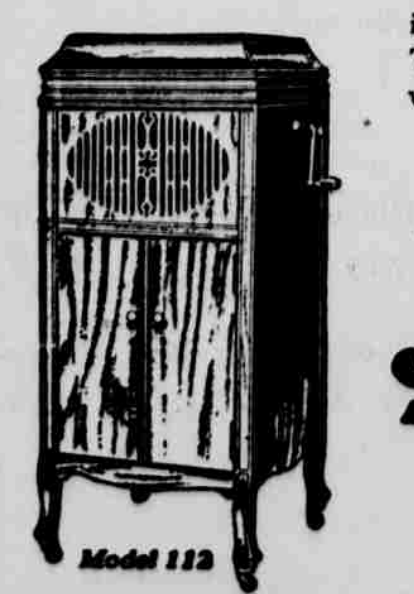
