WASHINGTON, May 7.—The senate agriculture committee today voted a favorable report on the Norris bill for the federal regulation of the packing industry.

Norris said that he would try to get his bill taken up in the senate soon. As originally introduced, the bill proposed the creation of a federal livestock commission, to have charge of government regulation of the packing industry.

The committee amended it to create one livestock commissioner, appointed by the president.

MEN ARE GOOD IN RATIO OF BIBLE UNDERSTANDING

CHICAGO, May 7.—Jim Hicks, whose photograph adorns the rogues' gallery here, has come to the point in his turbulent career where he is in communication with the president of the United States.

The correspondence pertains to the Holy Scriptures and how to help men live better, cleaner lives. Jim wouldn't have believed it once — he wouldn't have pictured himself writing to the president. He, a jailbird of the most pronounced type, with a record as a pickpocket, forger, gambler and gunman. Up to 1913, when he reformed, he had "done time" in 43 prisons!

Jim, who is 49 and slightly bald, was all smiles when a United News reporter slipped into his dingy little mission on West Van Buren street to see how he was getting on as superintendent of the Presbyterian Bible Society of America.

"Say, I've great news—read this: A letter from the president!" he exclaimed. "And to me, old Jim Hicks, the ex-jail bird!"

The communication read:

"I have always believed in the inspiration of the Holy Scriptures whereby they have become the expression to men of the world and will of God. I believe that from every point of view the study of the bible is one of the most worthy to which men may devote themselves, and that, in proportion as they know and understand it, their lives and actions will be better.

"Very sincerely yours,

Warren G. Harding."
"I'm going to spread the president's message broadcast," said Jim enthusiastically.

Jim's 1921 ambition, he asserted, is to distribute 250,000 Bibles, 250,000 pocket Testaments, 500,000 Gospels and 100,000 religious song books in the jails and prisons of the United States.

It's a much needed work, Jim explained, and by way of illustration, he pointed out that in 1880, when our population was 51,000,000, the Presbyterian population was 56,000;

today with a population of 106,000,000, we have a Presbyterian population of more than 2,000,000. Last year Jim himself carried the word of God to 40 prisons in 28 states.

"I handed 56,800 Bibles to men behind the cell doors," he declared. "I agree with President Harding—men are good in proportion as they know and understand the Bible. That's the point I'm going to spread broadcast."

And Jim Hicks smiled again—the smile of a crusader.

BILL WOULD RELIEVE WEST IRRIGATIONISTS

WASHINGTON, May 7.—Relief for the irrigation farmers of the west provided for in a resolution by Senator McNary, of Oregon, today passed by the senate. It provides that users of water from government irrigation projects who now owe for water already furnished, shall not be cut off from water this year but shall continue to receive water, notwithstanding arrears. This will permit many farmers to continue operations this year who otherwise would have to quit business, McNary said. House action is now necessary.

Ordinance No. 253, Section 18: It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to deposit in any street, alley or public place within the corporate limits of Dallas City any boxes, cans, paper, dirt, trash, manure, straw or rubbish of any kind whatsoever and allow the same to remain in such place for a longer time than 12 hours, and any person violating any of the above provisions shall, on conviction thereof before the recorder, be fined not less than five nor more than 20 dollars for each violation of this section and shall be imprisoned in the city jail until such fine be paid. This ordinance will be enforced.

a man capable of taking care of myself."

There was a pause.

"And will you be glad to get out?" he was asked.

"That's what has been keeping me alive—thinking of the day when I would again become a free man—able to go my own way," the man in prison grey replied.

"One hears so much—and so little—of what is going on outside, that, after an active life, a prison term is an intellectual death," he added.

"We hear so much now of wars and rumors of wars that it is almost appalling to think of facing the age old conflict of man and his brother."

"With labor troubles paramount in this country, disputes tearing Europe, strife is the keynote of the world refrain."

Originally sentenced to a 15-year term, the board of prison directors have ordered McNamara released after serving 10 years, part in San Quentin and a few months in the county jail in Los Angeles. Good behavior and strict compliance with all rules earned the respite.

His brother, James McNamara, was sentenced to life imprisonment

for his connection with the same case. It is possible that he may be paroled at some future date.

Union labor leaders of San Francisco who knew McNamara are preparing a welcome for him on the day he is released.

Smith, manager of the Journal Travel bureau of Portland, and succeeded in getting his assistance.

Numerous papers, affidavits and birth certificates were prepared to show that Molinaro was capable of providing for and educating the children. The entire passage money was paid.

The parents have been patiently waiting since October for the final arrangements permitting the children to come. At last the local Red Cross was notified that if some one would agree to look after them on board ship that they could come. Some one volunteered to do this and they arrived in Boston last week where they were cared for by the Boston Red Cross and were put on board train for The Dalles, Oregon.

The trip across the continent was hard for them, since they did not understand the English language or know American customs. They were afraid to leave the coach for food and so depended upon the fruits, candies and nuts which are regularly sold through the coaches. The conductor brought them sandwiches once.

Mrs. Saul and the family met Monday's trains, but the children did not arrive until early Tuesday morning, when there was nobody to meet them. Their ingenuity was then put to a test for the next move. The eldest boy carried an envelope, containing the name and address of his father, which had been sent from the local Red Cross months before. Seeing a taxicab waiting, he presented this envelope to the driver and they were motioned into the car and taken to the home on Mill creek.

They are wildly enthusiastic about America and say that they have no desire ever to go back to Italy. During the war, their grandmother's home was occupied by soldiers and the family forced to sleep in the cellar, with inadequate bedding and clothing, and very little of the coarsest food was given them. Since the war economic conditions have been so bad that their circumstances were far from pleasant.

government which is opposed to the Canton government) whom Japan put in office, but America did not know.

"We desire proper foreign aid and favor a consortium but money loaned to Peking will injure instead of help, for Peking is powerless in the hands of militarists.

"The province of Kwangsi now is mobilizing against Canton. They have about 50,000 troops. This being the only section now striking

against me we hope to withstand the shock.

"Our immediate need is foreign recognition. With this prestige the other provinces would rally around my government."

PEKIN, China, May 3.—Militarists making their headquarters here are alarmed at the success of Sun Yat Sen, president of the republican government at Canton, and are resorting to a campaign of vilification.

There are indications of the possible establishment of two republics in China as an outgrowth of the present situation.

The strongest Chinese patriots, however, disapprove of such a plan and continue to seek unification of China under one strong government.
