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PAGEANT DAY

Next Friday The Dallas is going to be held in the rest of the county; may, more, in all the rest of the world that cares to come.

The 181 will start rolling along about noon, and from then until any hour your care to call it Saturday morning something will be doing every minute.

There will be a big free feed at noon, with The Dallas-Wasco county chamber of commerce leading the counter. This will be followed by a ball game in the early afternoon between the independent team and Indian team from Warm Springs.

The historical pageant will follow in the early evening out at the automobile camp grounds and later will come the Elks' carnival.

The Dallas would like to have all the county here next Friday, and through the chamber of commerce is extending the invitation.

The historical pageant will be the biggest thing of its kind ever given in eastern Oregon. Hundreds of residents of the city, and of the county as well, will participate in a show symbolic of the growth of the Mother County of Old Oregon, from the days when the mountains that guard the Columbia were gods, until today.

The development of an historical pageant for The Dallas has been easy so far as material is concerned. The Dallas is rich in the history of the development of the northwest. Almost the first white explorers to pierce the northwestern wilderness, Lewis and Clark, stopped here. The little fortress city at the narrows of the Columbia was early a haven for refuge of the people who came in the prairie seasons to make up the Oregon aristocracy, for such are our pioneers of the '40s and '50s.

Next Friday will be one of the important days in the history of the city. The pageant may be successful, shepherly through the interest manifested, or it may not be. If it is successful, the pageant will become a permanent feature. And if it becomes a permanent feature it will be magnified in such a spectacle as the Pendleton Roundup, a true epic picture of the northwest.

Last week County Judge Addison suggested that the leaders of the forming committee of the county to branch in here to tell why the country folks want The Dallas-California highway to lead. They are coming. They will be here Friday. They will be a large, happy, smiling, in some one of the park, possibly the Union Street park.

Editor, The Chronicle:—The rapid rise of the river is a matter of concern and speculation to numerous persons.

Mosierites are disgruntled, we are told. They have not received enough out of the county for market roads in comparison with the amount of taxes paid, they say, so they have decided to turn down the bond issue.

But Mosier folks should remember in all fairness that this tent altogether a county issue, save that it benefits the county in an immense degree.

This is a state highway commission proposition far more than it is solely a Wasco county matter.

We only happen to be favorably located directly in the line of least resistance, we say to speak of the highway that is to pierce central and southern Oregon, making a great lateral east-west mountain highway.

The state highway commission says Mosier the Columbia river highway. It runs down the main street of Mosier, it passes through their choicest orchards, of which there are no fewer than thirty acres in all the northwest.

The state highway commission says Mosier this. The commission is now asking the county to cooperate in construction of the great southern road. It is asking the county to give something in order that all of the county will have more business.

There is no question that roads such as this bring more business to any county. Mosier knows. She has the Columbia river highway, and even though it isn't functioning to perfection yet, it is helping Mosier.

The Dallas-California highway is going to bring more business. All the travelers who are coming from the south and who go to the south will drive through Mosier, even as they are going to go through The Dallas and a lot of other places in the county.

Whether or not the people of Mosier like the county court, this road is to their own interest, and it is their duty to reciprocate. The Columbia river highway only runs along the fringe of Wasco county, so as to speak, whereas The Dallas-California highway goes right into its heart.

The whole county has benefited from the Columbia river highway. The whole county will benefit three fold from the lateral road. One does not have to be on a big road to benefit by it. The road system is developing throughout Oregon as has no other one thing since the white man chased out the Indians.

Market roads are being built everywhere to link up with the main arteries so that in a short time hardly a commodity will be isolated. Mosier is very much a portion of Wasco county and has duties to perform in common with the county. Just now her biggest obligation is to help out in The Dallas-California highway. She will be given a service from which profitable returns will come.

MORGANS ANNOUNCE NEW FRENCH LOAN

NEW YORK, May 24.—A new hundred million dollar loan to the French government, the proceeds of which are to be used to settle French obligations maturing in the United States during the current year and to cover purchases of raw materials and food stuffs here, was announced Monday night jointly by J. P. Morgan and company, in New York City, and Jean de Niessen, Inspector of Finance at France.

A country-wide syndicate is being formed to handle the new loan, which will run for 20 years at 7 1/2 percent. The French government agreed to pay into a sinking fund \$9,900,000 a year in equal monthly installments, which will be used to retire the bonds.

The issue will be offered at 95 and interest, yielding slightly more than 6 percent.

Bender (United News Staff Correspondent) WASHINGTON, May 24.—Rome great diplomatic listening post of Europe, will have in Richard Woodburn Child an American ambassador who believes his job should entail a maximum of activity his ears open and a minimum of keeping up appearances.

Child, therefore, upon going to Europe's leading post for international intrigues and old world diplomacy, will simply pursue the training received in journalism, which has been his life's work, and devote himself to recording events at his observation station overlooking scenes of most of Europe's storms, past and present.

Appointment of Child is not only important but interesting in that it constitutes something of an experiment in diplomacy. He is young, in years than most men upon whom such an honor is conferred, and is not possessed of the political "pull" or riches, usually so necessary if the cause of leading diplomats in continents. He may be expected to travel extensively through Italy, studying the various economic and political developments with an eye to sending first hand, independent information to the United States government, rather than propaganda that so often is fostered by the political stages with European governments.

It is more than likely that Child's characteristic, coupled with his training, will be to watch carefully any "shaking up" for his role by Harding to "revive" the old "reformer" center. And he may at a time when European youth are such as to increase necessity to close observation by the American government.

Already, according to authentic reports, the Germans are reaching out for Italian industry again. The year German hold on which results in cementing the famous triple alliance between Germany and Austria-Hungary and Italy, and almost offered Italian entrance into the war on the side of Germany.

The new move by Germany in Italy, of course, is a matter of interest and importance to the United States. It comes at a time when Italy, probably more than at any time in history, is turning to the United States with unquestioned willingness to cooperate with it.
