

# HARRIMAN CLUB LOSES TO LOCALS

## PITCHING OF WOOLSEY TOO MUCH FOR STRONG PORT- LAND TEAM.

The sixth time was on a sure sign for the fast Harriman club baseball team of Portland, which yesterday afternoon went down to defeat at the hands of the locals, 7 to 5. The Portland railroaders came to The Dalles with a record of having won five straight games this season, without losing one, and the least that enthusiasts expected was that the locals would be able to hold the visitors down to a close score.

The Portland team would probably have done just what the fans expected of it if it hadn't been for one thing. That thing was Pitcher Ed Woolsey, who was in form yesterday afternoon and proved it by causing 12 of the Portland iron pounders to whiff vainly at the elusive globe.

The locals found their batting eyes yesterday, bingling the opposing pitcher at opportune times.

A neat double play was pulled in the third inning. Two Portland men were on first, and second, when a third visitor knocked a hot liner to Second Baseman Ford. Ford fielded the ball perfectly and tossed it to Cullins, who had run from short to second. Cullins then shot the ball to first, completing the double play, the only one of the game.

Taking advantage of the visiting pitcher's queer habit of winding up with a man on third base, Whitten and Hoffman were both successful in stealing home. This was nothing very unusual for Whitten, who had proved himself a veritable kleptomaniac during the earlier stages of the game by stealing bases at will, much to the disgust of the visiting players.

The Harriman team will attempt to even matters up this afternoon, when a second game will be played on the old ball field. Today's game will start promptly at 2 o'clock. Carbo and Lawrence will do the hurling for the locals.

The Dalles record team, playing at Hood River, returned with the small end of a 7 to 4 score.

## HOME RUNS FLOURISH; "BABE" GETS FOURTEENTH

NEW YORK, May 30.—The home run industry flourished on many big league lots Sunday, especially in the Browns' park, St. Louis. Williams of the Browns and Grancy of the Indians got two apiece, and Elmer Smith of the Indians got one. The Indians won, 11 to 9, in a slugging melee, making 15 hits. The Browns got 18.

There were 12 homers all told. Elmer Smith now stands as the runner up for Babe Ruth's honors in the American league with six homers, displacing Ty Cobb and Bob Meusel of the Yankees, who have five each and who now share the third honors with Williams, of the Browns. However, the Babe slammed out another at the Polo grounds against the Athletics in the game which the Yanks won, 9 to 4 which makes his total 14, a considerable margin over the next highest man, Duran and Perkins of the Athletics got a homer apiece.

Meusel's home run in the Phillies-Robins game in Brooklyn, won the game for the Phillies, 2 to 1, and brought Meusel's total for the season so far to seven, just one fewer than George Kelly, of the Giants, leading home run slugger of the National league.

Smith and Lavan, of the Cards, each got a home run in the 6 to 4 victory of the St. Louis club in Chicago.

Barnhard, of the Pirates, got a home run against the Reds in Cincinnati, but the Reds finally won, in six innings, 4 to 3.

# MAY PASS NAVAL BILL THIS WEEK

WASHINGTON, May 30.—The senate this week is expected to pass the naval appropriations bill, which has been the subject of protracted debate and send it to conference with the house, where differences between the two chambers will be adjusted.

Senators have finished consideration of the building program, the personnel and disarmament, about which there was greatest dispute, so little remains to be done. The bill will be taken up Tuesday, since congress has adjourned over Memorial Day.

A dispute with the house in prospect over the disarmament amend-

ment to the bill. House Leader Mondell and others think the provision of the amendment is not sufficiently broad and expect to make changes in it.

The army appropriations bill is waiting its turn in the senate, the same group that has opposed passage of the naval bill seek to restrain its passage.

The house limited the size of the army to 150,000, senate leaders will seek to increase it to 170,000 in response to a plea from Secretary of War Weeks.

The house will probably be unable to begin consideration of the resolution establishing peace with Germany before next week, as Chairman Porter of the committee of foreign relations, does not expect it to leave the hands of the committee before that time.
