 LONDON, June 2.—The British government is preparing for a final military drive in the south of Ireland, a movement for war or peace war is the annihilation of Sinn Fein, or peace obtained through the threat of war, whichever the south of Ireland elects to choose.

If the newly elected members of the southern parliament refuse to take the oath of allegiance, and therefore refuse to function under the Home rule bill, battalions of British troops will be forced across the channel, pouring into every city and town outside of Galway, driving into the hills, combating the hills for rebels and staging a short, sharp and probably decisive conflict.

That much is authoritative. How big an army England intends to send in and what units are to be sent are facts closely guarded by the government. But undoubtedly, the garrisons from Ulster will be sent south, joining with the contingents from England and replaced in the north by constabulary.

During the past few weeks Irish warfare has been developing rapidly into more highly specialized and more efficient methods of attack and defense on both sides. The government action a new armored car especially designed to counteract Sinn Fein ambushes and so constructed that it reduces to a minimum the danger from road mines, with which Sinn Fein has lately been living up to the campaign.

A hundred of this new type of cars are already in Ireland and six more are sent over every day. They are the last word in fighting automobile battles. They carry armor: a ton manganese steel plate and are as close to bomb proof and bullet proof as they can be made. Furthermore, for all the ponderous weight of the machines, they can travel 50 miles an hour, with a crew of 10 men.
