**Avery Lasswell Is Banker**—Avery L. Lasswell, who is known in The Dalles, has assumed control of the Farmers' Security bank of Yoncalla, Ore., taking the position vacated by his father, J. R. Lasswell, who purchased the Commercial bank of Oakland, Ore. Mrs. Avery L. Lasswell was Miss Audrey Clock of this city.

**Charged With Non-Support**—Upon a justice court warrant, charging failure to support his two minor children, Russell Wintermute was arrested in Hood River yesterday at the request of Sheriff Levi Christman. Sheriff Christman journeyed to Hood River yesterday afternoon and returned with the prisoner.

**Fourth Celebration Planned**—Residents of The Dalles will be able to celebrate at home this Fourth of July, instead of journeying to neighboring cities. The local Knights of Pythias lodge has decided to sponsor a real, old-fashioned Fourth of July celebration, such as has not been held in this city in years. The celebration will be held at Thornton's Lakes, a short distance west of the city limits. All of the features necessary at any successful Fourth of July celebration, will be found at Thornton's Lakes on that day, including athletic contests of all kinds, swimming races, dancing, band concerts, fireworks, a greased pole and a greaser pig. Numerous prizes will be offered in all of the contests.

**To Arrest J. Phetteplace**—Deputy Sheriff Guy Elton left yesterday for Payette, Idaho, for the purpose of bringing Julien Phetteplace, arrested in that city, back to The Dalles for trial. Phetteplace was indicted by the recent grand jury upon information supplied by a local minor girl. He was arrested several weeks ago by the Payette police, but refused to waive extradition, compelling Sheriff Christman to secure the necessary extradition papers from Governor Olcott. Unless he is able to put up bail, young Phetteplace will probably have to remain in the county jail until the September term of court. The May term of court was in session when he was arrested, and had he been extradited and returned promptly to The Dalles, his case would probably have been disposed of by now.
