Sheriff to Arrest — Sheriff Levi Chrisman left for Ontario, Ore., this morning, to bring back a prisoner arrested upon a secret indictment returned by the recent grand jury.

Services At Rowena — A special preaching service will be held in the Rowena school building Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock. One of the city pastors will speak.

Ministerial Meeting Monday — The June meeting of the ministers of The Dalles will be held Monday morning at 10:30 o'clock in the trustees' room of the public library. Plans will be made for the summer Sunday evening park meetings.

Baccalaureate Service Tomorrow — Following the custom of former years, the protestant churches of the city will forego their regular evening services tomorrow and unite in the baccalaureate service at the high school. Several of the pastors will participate in the evening's program.

Birthday Party in East End — An interesting surprise party was given Thursday evening at the home of John Lang on Lewis street. The occasion was in honor of the 16th birthday anniversary of Guy Lang and was attended by a large crowd of young folks of his Sunday school class and the boys' club of the high school.

Julian Phetteplace Returned — Deputy Sheriff Guy Elton returned this morning from Payette, Idaho, with Julian Phetteplace as a prisoner. Phetteplace was arrested in Idaho at the request of Sheriff Chrisman, following the return of an indictment by the grand jury. He is held in the county jail in default of \$1,000 bail.

Safety Committee Meeting — The next meeting of The Dalles local committee on safety will be held in a room adjacent to the yard master's office at 1:30 p. m., June 13. This meeting is for all employees of the O. W. R. & N. company and the general public is also invited to attend, according to C. R. Marshall, local agent for the railroad company.

Walker, 19, of Portland.

Many See Hygienic Film — The hygienic film shown at the court house Thursday evening by the Oregon State Hygienic society was well received by a large audience. The subject was "The Reproduction of Life" and only microscopic discoveries concerning the manner in which living cells, both vegetable and animal, multiply themselves, were thrown on the screen.

Auditorium Plans Committee Meets — The auditorium plans committee, named by Mayor P. J. Stadelman to pass upon plans submitted for the new \$114,000 municipal auditorium, met last night in the city hall to review the completed working plans, as submitted by Houghtaling and Dougan, Portland architects. Owing to the fact that several members of the committee were at Tugh Valley

attending the road bond rally, no official action as to the acceptance of the plans, was taken.

School Board Election — Persons with ambitions to be members of the city school board will have an opportunity to attempt the fulfillment of their hopes Monday, June 20, when the annual school election will be held. Plans for the election were completed last night at the regular meeting of the school board. Two directors will be elected at this time, to serve for terms of three years each. Persons desiring to enter their names in nomination should communicate with Miss Prudence Patterson, district clerk of the board.

To Operate Vacation School — Plans are in progress for the opening of a daily vacation Bible school to be carried on in the Calvary Baptist church for three weeks commencing June 29. The school will be operated only in the morning from 9 to 11:30 o'clock and will be open to about 75 children ranging from four to 12 years of age. The program outlined calls for story telling, singing, Bible hand work, manual training, raffle work, map building, games, calisthenics and a lecture. No charge will be made for admission to the school and at its close an exhibition will be given showing the results.

Stray Cows in Danger — Wandering bovines are causing Chief of Police Frank Heater considerable worry. He complains, following reports by irate housewives of stray cows eating up family gardens and causing destruction in general. A city ordinance provides that cows shall not be staked along public highways, but persons who are cutting down the high cost of living by keeping a cow have been disregarding this law, according to Heater. The chief of police is not going to wait for Bossy to break loose and do a lot of damage before taking action in the future, but is going to pick up all cows taken out and take them to the city pound, he warns.

Community Meeting Postponed — Because of the several last-minute allies which will be held in the county Monday evening, prior to the special election to be held on the next day, the big community meeting scheduled for Monday night in the Union street park has been postponed until Wednesday night, 7:30, at the same place. H. W. Arbury, Community Service Director, announced this morning. All persons interested in the workings of Community Service are invited to be present at the Union street park Wednesday evening, when plans for work to be carried out in this city during the remainder of the present year, will be agreed upon. A special program will also be presented, with speeches, vocal selections and music of various kinds as entertainment.
