

DEMPSEY RESTS UNTIL FRIDAY

CHAMP EYES SPARRING VICTIMS, PLANNING NEXT WEEK'S SLAUGHTER.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., June 14—Jack Dempsey bore up well today under the strain of doing nothing. Looting on the steps of his house here today, Jack watched his sparring partners, Marty Burke, Jack Renault and Larry Williams, dolled to the limit of the style of 1922, head for the board walk.

"They're having their run now, gritted the champion. "Wait until I get at them next week."

He swung his heavy left arm in a vicious sweep to emphasize the threat.

Manager Jack Kearns told his charge today that he could do no real work until Friday.

"It isn't that bad eye that's keeping us back," Kearns said.

"Jack is going top fine. He's down to 192, and he needed a rest. When he starts again he can go at high speed to the day of the fight. He won't need ten days' rest to put him in better shape than he was at Toledo.

The hardest work permitted the champion now is a brief walk. His trainers look at him suspiciously if he remains away from camp more than an hour, fearing that he has extended the walk allowed him.

REPUBLICANS FIGHT OVER PATRONAGE

WASHINGTON, June 14.—Collection of "promissory notes," issued by some enthusiastic politicians before, during and after the republican convention last June is causing trouble in republican party circles.

These "promissory notes" were in fact vague assurances of federal jobs. They were not made in a way to violate the Federal corrupt practices act, but apparently many workers took them to be good and are now holding the makers for payment.

That, in substance, is the bottom of the situation which was exemplified in the quarrel between Senator Frelinghuysen of New Jersey and Attorney General Daugherty over patronage.

As explained by republican politicians here, too many promises were made by too many persons. These promises were mostly vague and were born perhaps of the enthusiasm of the moment. But now it develops that a good many more folks have expectations than there are places.

Daugherty, as President Harding's chief political advisor, has been more or less in charge of the pie counter. He has been of course in sole charge of the many federal judgeships, district attorneyships, and U. S. marshalships which come

under the department of justice. He has in some cases appointed men whose selection was a great disappointment of other republican politicians, who had given other candidates assurances.

After it became known that Frelinghuysen and Daugherty had hot words in Daugherty's office over New Jersey patronage, many republican members of congress began to discuss their differences with Daugherty.
