

# TORTURE OF SOLDIER CHARGED BY MOTHER

 WASHINGTON, June 16. — Representative Rosenbloom of West Virginia, will ask Secretary of War Weeks about the alleged torture of an enlisted man at Fort Oglethorpe on Thursday.

Rosenbloom will be accompanied by the mother of the soldier, Mrs. Louise Rhodes of Richmond, who came to Washington to put her complaint before the government.

It was said that Rhodes was absent without leave for 25 hours recently and was given kitchen police duty as punishment. After the lapse of 19 days, when his punishment was supposed to expire, he was assigned to another period of "K. P."

Rhodes is said to have refused, following which he was placed in the guard house. He broke confinement, and, according to the story told here, was thereupon put in shackles, and was prevented for 17 days from removing any of his clothing. His right leg, the story goes, became infected and was lanced at the hospital, the shackles were not removed, and he was compelled to work until he fell from weakness and pain. Then his leg was again lanced and when it was feared amputation might be necessary because of the infection, the shackles were removed in a blacksmith shop, it is said.

Peggy's character, as charged. "She blackened it herself," he declared. He said she was an "admitted bigamist" and that she accepted \$100,000 from Joyce before she had been married to him.

Austrian said that any good woman would not remain in Europe for four months after her husband had been called home on business without giving her husband an explanation.

"Peggy, after salivating to all the watering places of Europe, came back four months later," Joyce's counsel said. "Had she cabled him at any time in the interim? She had not. When she did come back to New York she remained for five weeks before she communicated with him in any way. And then—why? She wanted money for an 'operation' for appendicitis—and she had no such operation performed. It was one of her fibs."
