

### NEW REPORT GIVEN ON NEARBY ROADS

The following report on the condition of roads in the eastern Oregon division was issued today by J. H. Scott, division engineer:

- Hood River-Mosier**—Paving operations under way. Road closed to traffic 8:00 a. m. to 12:30 p. m. Open 12:30 to 1:00 p. m. Closed 1:00 to 5:30 p. m. Open 5:30 p. m. to 8:00 a. m. During the time this road is closed traffic can detour by way of the old Mosier hill, though it is inadvisable to time a trip to take advantage of open hours on the highway. Mosier hill is passable, but travel is cautioned to use care in driving, and have plenty of gas.
- Mosier-The Dalles**—New gravelled road in fair condition—a much easier and safer road than Seven Mile hill. Paving will begin about July 1, but a temporary detour will be provided at The Dalles' end of the section.
- The Dalles-Deschutes River**—New road not yet open—impassable. Take detour road over the hill. Deschutes River bridge open—no toll.
- Bend-Burns**—Fair condition. Take new road out of Bend for 16 miles.
- The Dalles-Madras (Bend and Redmond)** by way of Sherman county, Wasco, Moro, Grass Valley, Shaniko

and Antelope Road in good condition. **The Dalles-City**—Road in good condition, last twenty miles good gravelled road. **Prairie City-Baker**—Road over the mountain is now open and in usual summer condition. **Deschutes River-Heppner Junction**—Good gravel or crushed rock road all the way except four miles east of John Day River bridge. Macadam work under way on this four miles, but road is open to traffic. **The Dalles-California Highway** (The Central Oregon) **The Dalles-Madras**—It is in fair shape, usual summer condition of this road. Through Dufur, Maupin, Bake Oven or Critteron, Antelope to Madras. **Madras Crooked River**—New crushed rock road. **Crooked River-Bend**—Newly gravelled road in good condition. **John Day Highway**. **Arlington-Condor**—Fair condition. **Condor-Fossil**—Fair, except six miles between Thirty Mile and Maryville, still necessary to use old road, as new road is in process of construction and very rough.

and as soon as the election returns showed that the measure had carried. The appointees are Captain Lyman G. Rice, of Pendleton, and Arthur C. Spencer, of Portland. The other members, provided by the act, are the governor, the secretary of state, Sam A. Keen, and the adjutant general, George A. White. The act is not yet effective and will not be until the governor officially proclaims the constitutional amendment following the official canvassing of the vote. The early appointment of the commissioners, however, makes it possible for them to have much of the preliminary work out of the way by the time the act is effective. Here are some of the reasons for delay that probably will cause no less than four months to go by before any bonds can be sold and money made available. In the first place, the vote is not likely to be canvassed for four or five weeks and the effective date of the act will be held up accordingly. Then one of the most important features of the act is the organization, which necessarily will require attention on the part of the commission. This is the provision that in each county there shall be appointed by the commission a board of three appraisers, who shall fix valuation up on properties on which loans may be applied for, and also shall appoint an attorney, who shall pass on the titles to property. This necessitates 114 separate appointments by the commission, and will take time. Other delays that will help hold up the operation of the measure for a few months will be those incident to advertising for bids on bonds and subsequent negotiations with bond brokers. Also time will be consumed in the drawing up and printing of forms on which applications may be made by beneficiaries. Only the constitutional amendment was voted on by the people. The legislature passed the law which provides all the machinery, but by a clerical error the referendum clause is attached to the legislative act in the session laws which has been misleading to numbers of persons. The loans must be repaid to the state, and the applicant, his or her father, mother, wife or husband, child, sister or brother must secure such payment by a first mortgage on real estate at 7 percent in value in excess of the amount loaned. The service man or woman alone can secure the loan but the relatives named can assist by supplying the necessary security. The applicant cannot have both a loan and the cash bonus. If he accepts the bonus he must make his application to the secretary of the commission within one year after the effective date of the act or within one year after his discharge from the service at the time the act became effective. He may have only one loan, but he may apply for it immediately or at any time during the future. Number Estimated at 25,000. It has been estimated that 25,000 men and women will come within the benefits of the law. The number who will ask cash bonuses is estimated at 10,000 and those who will prefer loans at 15,000. The assessed valuation of the state is \$1,040,839,049.12. Three percent of this is \$31,225,177.47, the amount of the fund now created. The loans coming out of this sum will be repaid the state. While the cash bonus total, estimated at \$1,200,000, will not be repaid, the amount will be cared for by the 1-mill levy. The 1-mill levy on the basis of the present valuation will produce annually \$1,040,839.04. **Loans Run 28 Years** While the loans may run for 28 years, being amortized at 2 percent yearly and 4 per cent being paid on interest, it is assumed that a great majority of the borrowers will repay in much less than the maximum time. Under the law in the event that congress should provide for the payment of cash bonuses to persons qualified to receive bonuses under the Oregon act on or before the date the Oregon amendment becomes effective then any person qualified to
