Indian's Body Found—The flooded Columbia river claimed one human victim today. It is known that the skeleton body of a young Indian, apparently about 25 years old, was yesterday afternoon found floating in an eddy a short distance below Celilo Falls. Formerly C. N. Burget believes that the body has been dead for some time. The Indian will be given a preliminary burial in the Odd Fellows cemetery. It is thought that he was drowned further up the river when the flood was at its crest, the body floating down until caught in the eddy in which it was found.

To Meet With Commission—The Wasco county court will confer with the state highway commission in Portland Monday, at which time definite plans for the construction of The Dalles-Columbia highway will be formulated. County Judge J. T. Adkisson announced this morning, following a conference with State Highway Commissioner, W. B. Barratt, who stopped in The Dalles enroute to his home in Heppner, Barratt expressed himself as being highly pleased with the outcome of the election, according to Judge Adkisson. The county court will also take up the county market road situation with the highway commission at Monday's meeting.

Premature Fourth Celebrations—Chief of Police Frank Heater is having the usual trouble this year with the younger generation of The Dalles, who wish to stage premature celebrations of the Fourth of July by shooting off fireworks and other explosive contrivances offered for sale by local merchants. The Dalles city ordinance prohibiting the shooting off of fireworks inside the city limits, but the average small boy has little regard for city ordinances, especially when fireworks are temptingly offered for sale by local merchants. Chief Heater has announced that he will prosecute all persons caught setting off fireworks in the city. No law applies to the shooting of fireworks outside of the city limits, however.

Two Automobiles Stolen—With two automobiles stolen from the business streets of The Dalles in broad daylight during this week and neither recovered as yet, the police are beginning to wonder if there is any possibility of an organized ring of automobile thieves operating in The Dalles. Ed Merrillfield yesterday reported his Chevrolet automobile stolen from where it had been parked at the curb on Washington street, near Second. The day previous, an automobile owned by John Wernmark was stolen from where it was parked by the curb near Court and Second streets. Merrillfield today swore out a "John Doe" warrant in the justice court for the arrest of the automobile thief or thieves.

City Maps for Tourists—A map of The Dalles, showing all hotels, garages, the postoffice, auto camp grounds, east and west entrances of the Columbia River highway, entrance of The Dalles-Columbia highway and all streets in the city, is being prepared by Secretary E. P. Van Schoeck of The Dalles-Wasco County Chamber of Commerce. The map will be for distribution by the various stores and garages to tourists. It is interesting to note that the creek running through the auto park is named Quenett creek upon the new map. This is in line with the decision of chamber directors to adopt the use of the name Quenett creek instead of Mill creek. Quenett is the true name of the creek, having been given by Lewis and Clark upon their voyage down the Columbia. Chautauqua Leaders Will Meet—For the purpose of making final arrangements for the staging of the coming chautauqua festival, members of the executive board and guarantors will meet tonight in the office of the Crandall Undertaking company, according to Mrs. Lulu D. Rainey has served in congress for 18 years and during the war period was the ranking democrat of the house ways and means committee.
