The Imperial Mills of this city now ship their flour wholly to Boston, Mass., where it commands the highest prices—and meets with ready sale.

Gov. Geo. L. Woods called on Wednesday, none the worse, in appearance at least, for the storm of abuse being heaped upon him by the rebel press of this State.

Messrs. Miller, Marshall & Co.'s Oregon City Flouring Mill commenced operations on Tuesday evening last. The mill is a perfect success.

Chief Engineer Brooks of the O. C. R. R., called upon us on Monday last. The work will be vigorously pushed as soon as spring opens.

Dogs in the north eastern part of this precinct are suffering death! at the hands of thoughtful owners who prefer their sheep to the canine.

Several petitions will be presented to the next County Court for new roads in this county, according to the Court House bulletin board, in this city.

The Ku-Kluxers broke up in another row on Tuesday evening. The authorities stepped in and put a stop to the disturbances by turning out the lights.

The ladies of the Congregational Church at Astoria will hold a fair on the evening of the 19th. We hope to hear a favorable report from it. Rev. Mr. Gray is deserving of a good report.

One week from to-day Quarterly Meeting will be commenced in this city, at the M. E. Church. Rev. J. F. DeVore, P. E., will preach on the 21st, morning and evening.

The thief who relieved Hon. D. P. Thompson of valuable papers and money on the evening of the 21st ult., has returned a part of the papers—leaving them in the barn on Mr. Thompson's premises.

A change has been made in the time of the departure of the mails from Portland to Clear Creek, Damascus, etc. We shall endeavor to meet the change by sending our papers to Portland one day earlier.

Wednesday last was the 25th anniversary of the birth of the first white male child (Mr. S. D. Richardson) in Oregon City. We believe that Mr. R. can justly claim that he is the first white male born in Oregon, the event being dated February 19th 1841. Oregon was then a howling wilderness.

Brother Carter of the Corvallis Gazette, "returned our call" on Wednesday last while on his way to Portland. We hope that the fraternity at the metropolis will be care of him, that he may return in the same good order as when he left home.

The Apollo Minstrel—composed of boys from our own town who are more capable of entertaining an audience than half the traveling troupes on this coast—gave another complete exhibition on Wednesday evening last. The audience was large, respectable, and highly entertained.

We have been invited to visit the residence of Mr. Wm. Cassaday, at Casemah, and inspect the first Oregon-made cooking stove. Mr. C. is a furnace-man himself, made the patterns for this stove, and cast it at Salem of Oswego Iron. He is of the opinion that all hollow-ware can be cast in Oregon, and be sold at a better profit than the imported article.

Mr. J. L. Stout, of Unity, Bakers Bay, W. T. is in this city, and will remain here for several days, hoping to find a purchaser for a valuable tract of 430 acres of land owned by him, and lying in the southern part of this county, 12 miles from Oregon City. Any person wishing to buy a good farm, or farm, can certainly do no better than bargain at least, with Mr. Stout. Mr. S. may be found at the City House.

We learn that Clackams county has brought suit against the P. T. Co., for injuries done the public highway between this city and Casemah. The damages are put down at \$10,000. The injury to the road was caused by building the break-water and basin. In very high water a portion of the road is overflowed. The action is being tried in Portland at this time of the Circuit Court.

Hon. J. F. Caples, of Portland, addressed a large audience in this city, at the M. E. Church on Friday evening of last week upon the subject of Temperance, presenting some truths in a light that ought to carry conviction to the minds and consciences of some at least, who devote too much attention to rum guzzling. It was an interesting lecture.

News reached this city on Wednesday evening last of the death of Robert Moore, at Walla Walla. W. T. He was the eldest son we believe, of James M. Moore, Esq., of this city. His health had been failing for some time, growing into consumption, and he had gone to Walla Walla in hope of receiving benefits from a drier climate, when he died. Mr. Moore was a young man—about 18 years of age.

Mr. George R. H. Miller has at length started the long proposed flight of steps up the bluff at the head of Third street. The distance to be built up is over 80 feet. The stairs are in cross sections, and at each turn there is a platform of ample room for a rest. This is one of the best improvements yet made to enable people living on the bluff to reach their homes safely and easily. Now if the wagon road can be constructed up Seventh street this is all we shall ask for at the hands of the Council, or County Court, in this respect, for at least a number of years will improve our own streets, and private property—but help us to get to our homes.

The Edward Everett company of California, celebrated its 29th anniversary on the 11th ult. The Times corroborates the statement that the Edward Everett company built the first Pacific coast steamboat "deserving of a name." There is in this town, however, an engineer who had something to do with a steamboat in San Francisco harbor as early as November 1847. Oregon City is the Pioneer City of the coast, and he is a member of the Pioneer Society, which do not belong to any Pioneer Association. If we can meet with a second we move that a new Pioneer Association be organized, to be known as the "Original Pioneers."

Mr. John T. Scott, of Forest Grove, Washington county, visited Oregon City on Wednesday last, having come from near the Grove by steam! The steamer Oregan, Capt. Kellogg, jr., brought him to Colfax on the Tualatin from whence he passed over the Oswego Mill Company's Railroad to Oswego Lake, across that by the steamer boat of the Lewis & Oswego. Thence by P. T. Company's steamer Boat to Oregon City. This new route is popular in Washington county, and it should be.
