resentatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

That the following sums be, and the same are hereby, appropriated, out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the support of the Military Academy for the year ending the thirtieth June, eighteen bundled and coventy. hundred and seventy :

For additional pay of officers, and for pay of instructors, cadets, and musicians, one hundred and eighty-four thousand five hundred and seventy dollars and eighty-eight For commutation of officers' subsistence,

six thousand one hundred and thirty-two For pay in lieu of clothing to officers servants, one hundred and fifty six dollars. For current and ordinary expenses, sixty-que thousand nine hundred and thirty dol-

For forage for artillery and cavalry horses, our thousand dollars. For horses for artillery and cavalry practice, two thousand dollars. For repairs of officers' quarters, three thousand dollars. For furniture for cadets' hospital, five

hundred dollars. For gas pipes, gasometers, and retorts, six hundred doilars. For materials for quarters for subaltern officers, three thousand dollars. For purchase of fuel for cadets' mess-hall,

two thousand dollars. For furniture for soldiers' hespital, one hundred dollars. For reflooring academic building and barracks, one thousand dollars.

For repairing roads, five hundred dollars. For contingencies for the superintendent of the academy, one thousand dollars.


