We took a five hour's walk in the country on Saturday last, in company with Rev. C. W. Todd, and although somewhat weary, enjoyed the pleasure remarkably well. We visited the paper mill, on the Clackamas river, and two or three farms including that of Mr. P. M. Rinearson.

The paper mill is busily engaged, manufacturing a much better quality of paper than is usually sold in the markets of this county. We were kindly shown through the mill, from the rag sorting room to the packing and shipping room, and the entire process was clearly explained to us, by Mr. H. S. Beck. Oregonians should patronize these home manufactures as much as it is possible for them to do. Mr. Lewis, the Superintendent, is one amongst the most skillful operators in that branch of business in the United States, and that machinery is of the very best kind that is manufactured. From the mill we walked down to Mr. Rinearson's farm, through green fields and the fragrant odors of cool woodlands. On the way we passed a farmer, employed with a field-roller, driving over a wheat field, and it would not be with a flourish hope—that he would not see paid from the crop for his trouble, except upon a should wheat command no better prices next season than the last.

The cause of this we learned was from the fact that the seed had been subjected to the "viril process" with the view of preventing smut. The consequence is that perhaps not more than one half of the seed took root. We never believed extensively in the method, and this day's observation taught us the necessity of exercising great precaution, at all events, in the management of the viril process. We found Mr. Rinearson actively employed, and everything about his premises surly indicated that an abundant harvest was approaching for all cereals, fruits and vegetables.

Carbonate of Prot. Oxide of Iron.....6.00 "

Sulphate of Soda.....3.40 "

Phosphate of Soda.....6.45 "

The valuable properties of such water as a tonic and alterative, will be at once recognized by every one familiar with such things.

There is a ledge of clay near the Clackamas river, within three miles of this city, which is scarcely distinguishable from the finest quality of English clay. It has been tested by competent persons, and satisfactory evidences were furnished to show that porcelain of the finest quality may be manufactured from it. This discovery adds another important item to the already long list of rich minerals in Clackamas county.

At the Plowing match near Albany, on Saturday last, Mr. J. W. Lewis of this city, took the first premium with his Peil Gang Plow. Oregon City has thus far carried off more first premiums, at the State Fair, and trials of the character of this one at Albany, than any county in the State—and yet Oregon City is the dearest hole in Oregon, according to some certain spirits we know of. There is to be another trial soon for the best of satkey plows, and the "old-fashioned walking plow." Velocipede is the word.

The O. C. R. B. Company, have now two 4-horse teams, and three teams of four yokes of oxen each, employed in distributing ties along the line of the road from mill No. 2, to Portland. As soon as the track is laid to the mill the ties will then be distributed by cars, made for that purpose. The ties for five miles have been cut at Mill No. 2, and will reach there as it may be necessary to go ahead again, the mill will remain idle.

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Put Smith, of Portland, belongs the credit of having brought out to this State the only horse, "Patfinder," which can boast the close relationship of half brother to the renowned "Dexter." The following article speaks for itself:

Dexter a Morrill Colt—Curious Exposure.

The last celebration, under the above heading contains the following article relative to the paternity of the celebrated trotting horse "Dexter"—alleging that he was sired by the famous Morrill horse, formerly of this village. Be that as it may, it is certain that those possessing, also, many other excellent qualities. The article which we quote, will therefore, be of interest to a large number of persons in this vicinity. The Californian, N. Y., says:

A discovery has been made in regard to the famous trotting horse Dexter, now owned by Robert Donner of the New York Ledger, which is destined to create a little stir among the horse fanciers of this country, and at the same time take the credit of that celebrated horse from the honorable name of Morrill, who has always been acknowledged to place it to the credit of the Morrill blood, where it belongs.

In short, Dexter was raised in Danville, California county; his sire was the old French Morrill horse, and his dam the Bovee mare. This, in fact, is the pedigree of the wonderful horse, as the story goes. The person who has made this discovery is Cornelius Russell, a man who came here from Rockwell, Illinois, last year. The manner of the discovery as we understand it, was in this wise: Mr. Russell became impressed with the similarity of Dexter to the Morrill stock, and by considerable correspondence and inquiry, he traced his horse back from New York to Chicago, and from Chicago to Lower Canada, thence to Concord, N. H., and from the latter place to Mr. Bovee, now of Passumpsic, but who was formerly in Danville.

On talking with Mr. Bovee, the latter said he raised a certain colt, some years ago, which was an excellent likely one, and brought it to the price, this colt went to Concord, N. H., after which he lost trace of him. In describing this colt he described Dexter perfectly, and those who have seen this celebrated horse, know that he is peculiarly marked. In addition to this we remember Mr. Russell has the address of all the parties through whose hands Dexter passed from the time he left Mr. Bovee until he came into the hands of Mr. Russell at Chicago. On learning these facts, Mr. Russell purchased the Bovee mare at once, and together with the Colman and Richard Morrill horses which he already owned, started last Monday for Illinois.
