AGRICULTURAL FACTS.

Delaware proposes to have an Agricultural College. The average price of productive land is highest in New-Jersey, lowest in Florida.

Until agriculture had railways it was almost impossible for her to improve. The people of this country have yet to learn that the roots of the grape vine cannot be kept too dry.

The total number of sheep in the United States is estimated at 35,000,000, of which California has one-seventh.

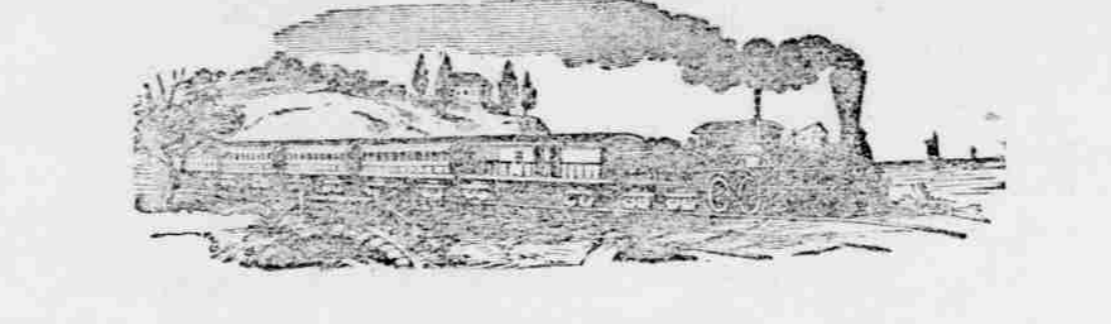
