AGRICULTURAL FACTS. Land is held at not less than \$100 within as many miles of San Francisco, and it is dearer within ten miles than within ten miles of London.

Some of the sugar plantations of Louisiana had done so well this year as to have yielded sums equal in value to lands, houses, and machinery.

Tippecanoe County, Indiana, offers \$50,000 if the State will locate the Agricultural College within their limits. That is not only public spirit, but true thrift.

Esparto grass will be sowed considerably in South Carolina this Spring. It is raised as easily as clover, and affords a good substitute for rags in making paper.

In the past the chief study has been to take the greatest weight of grain from land; in future the chief care will be to take the greatest weight of meat from an acre.

The good time coming will begin when the horse-power in farm work eats coal instead of corn, and when the scum of cities enriches the earth instead of polluting air and defiling water.

When a ton of wheat is marketed it leaves nothing behind but \$5 worth of straw. When a ton of meat is sold, it has left behind it nine-tenths of the manurial value of the food consumed in making it.

The highest order of charity is that which provides employment for the willing laborer, and leaves uncompromised his self-dependence; work without wages makes slaves; wages without work makes paupers.

The quality of food from land marks man's advance. The savager gets a few pounds of wild meat from an acre; the half-civilized a few bushels of coarse grain; the civilized man takes wheat and juicy flesh from his surface.

Wheat bran, oatmeal, scraps of meat, cheese-rinds should be fed to hens at this time of the year, because they contain albumen, of which there is much in an egg. Chopped vegetables will make them healthy; corn meal is more useful in fattening poultry.

In consequence of the great increase of farm implements, the question must soon be met: Can fifty small farmers, with little or no machinery, compete successfully with one farmer who owns as much land as all of them, and abundant machinery for working it?

A Committee of Boston ladies has appeared before a committee of the Massachusetts Horticultural Society, and consulted with them on a plan for a school of gardening for women. They want 100 acres near a good market, and propose to make the school industrial and self-supporting.

The Fruit Grower's Association at Rochester have been discussing whether it pays best to raise a large crop of a prolific variety or a few choice and high-priced sorts. One gentleman said, that in Rochester it costs six cents to grow a quart of Wilsons strawberries. The testimony was that it is more profitable to raise the finer varieties.

Within nine years past the Nebraska lands have increased most in value. They sell now for nearly four times as much as they did just before the war. During the same period Louisiana property has decreased most, selling now 70 percent below what it was worth when the State was represented in the United States Senate by Judah P. Benjamin.

Lands are made to increase yearly in fertility, mainly in three ways—by buying commercial fertilizers, by plowing under clover, by buying rich food for animals and saving all their droppings. That farmer understands his business who knows which mode is best for him. The most successful farmers practice all three.

The juice of the currant, cherry blackberry, &c., does not make a wine, properly speaking. The liquor of these berries retains the acid of the fruit; but the acid of the grape separates from the juice, and in the wines crystallizes, forming bitartrate of potash. Superior wines have never been produced except on soils rich in potash.

The blooms of the common marigold [calendula] infused in equal parts of pure alcohol and water, is an admirable remedy for all kinds of wounds, cuts, bruises, and burns, on man or beast. Its effect in allaying pain and removing soreness is similar to that of tincture of arnica. One ounce of the blooms to a half pint of alcohol and a half pint of water is the receipt.

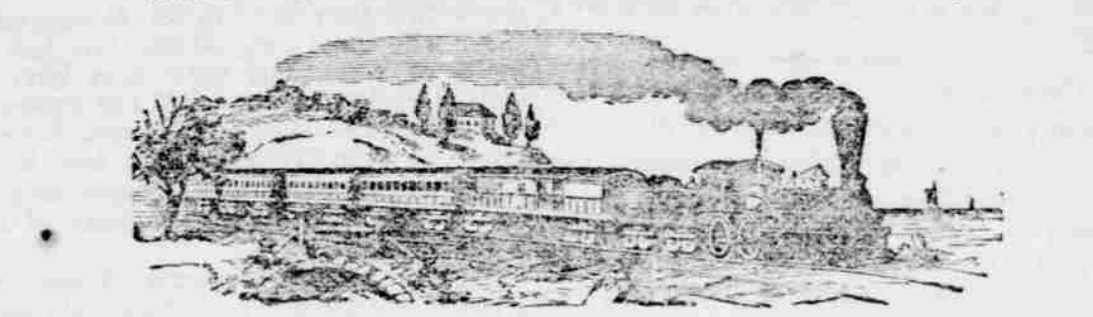
