THE NATION.—We have seen several numbers of this excellent paper published at New York City, at five dollars per year, legal tender. A VALUABLE DISCOVERY.—Yesterday Dr. Ross showed us a specimen of what he pronounces to be a very pure article of native plumbago, or black lead. So far as we are capable of judging, without applying the tests, it resembles the articles in every particular. It is found where the railroad cuts through a portion of the bluff in the upper part of this city, and the deposit where it crops out is about one foot in thickness, and two rods wide. The native carburet of iron, commonly known under the name of black lead, or plumbago, contains 95 parts of carbon and 5 of iron. This substance is infusible at the highest heat of a furnace, and hence is employed in making crucibles and melting pots. It is also used in making black lead pencils.
