Letter from Clear Creek.

CLEAR CREEK, Oregon, Feb. 14th, 1870. The Weekly Enterprise:—

I intended to have given you a few lines in relation to the manufacture of lumber at the various saw mills in this part of the county, but as yet I have been unable to procure the necessary data from which to write. But I wish to call the attention of some enterprising, go-ahead men to the fact that there is a large and extensive grove of timber, known by the name of "Larch," situated near the head of this creek, some fourteen or eighteen miles from this place. The timber is of the finest quality, and easy to get at, which is bound to make it valuable at no distant day. The man that has the pluck and energy to put in operation a good saw mill and go to manufacturing lumber, cannot help but make a fortune with the right kind of management, as it is said that Larch makes the best finishing lumber we have on this coast.

Had it not been rainy for the past few days, some of the farmers in this and the Palmyer settlement would be sowing their spring wheat. We hope they will sow early, and plenty of it. Every farmer should make it a point to put in a few acres, at least; it will save them money by so doing. The farmers should seed down more of their land into grass and clover. Hay at from ten to twenty dollars per ton, out in the country, is entirely too much.

It is confidently expected that more improvements in the shape of building houses and barns will be done the coming season than has been done in any season heretofore. Lumber is cheap here, and with a little capital and more energy, one can have good buildings to live in instead of old rickety shanties.

By the way, if any one in the county is seeking a location for a country store, let them come and look at this place. There is no better place in the State for a country store than this. We have a good church, and can have one of the best of schools.

We have plenty of water power to run the various kinds of machinery. We have a good saw mill, and it won't be long before we have a grist mill, as I am informed by the gentleman who owns the mill privilege here. We certainly need a good grist mill in this vicinity, and the man that puts one up, and does the fair thing, will be entitled to the gratitude of the people.

A little competition is what we want out here in the shape of stores and mills, some gentlemen to the contrary notwithstanding. Our three months winter school closes this week, just as the scholars begin to learn. As a general thing, a three months' school uses up all the public money, and we go without the balance of the year. That makes it bad, too, for the children here are sadly in need of more learning. But the people begin to open their eyes to the necessity of raising a direct tax for the purpose of having a longer term of school. A meeting comes off this week for that purpose, and we sincerely hope that the friends of education and progress may win the day, and give us more schools.

I understand that the County Commissioners have appropriated a small sum for the purpose of building a new bridge at this place. The public need a good bridge here, and if this is the case, it will be thankfully received. We hope if we ever have another Legislature to make laws for our good, that they will put a heavier road tax on the people, so that we can have so respectable roads to travel on. The roads we have in this part of the county are a disgrace to any place.

We hope no one will take exception to this. Yours, &c. St. Elmo.

A New Gas Generator.

During this week Mr. J. J. Miller has had on exhibition in the Odd Fellows' building, in this place, a new machine for the generation of lighting gas. We saw it, and were much pleased with it, and we think our business houses would do well to secure the right to use it. The Oregonian of the 23d of February contains the following remarks in regard to this new gas generator, which we believe to be correct:

It is claimed for it that it is absolutely safe from explosion and that it will furnish gas at the rate of not over \$2 per thousand feet. The cost of the machine is about \$100 for eight burners. We have seen it in operation, and without attempting to describe the process of gas generation, we have no hesitation in saying that it seems to have all the advantages which the proprietor claims for it. The lights are as steady as ordinary gas lights, and fully as brilliant. The burners can be used with or without chimneys, though with chimneys the light is steadier and more powerful. The machine is so arranged that gas is generated in quantity to suit the consumption. There is no perceptible difference in the flame, whether one or all the burners are in use. If all are lighted, the machine simply runs faster and generates gas more rapidly. For hotels or other public buildings, or for dwellings where several high gas lights can be used at a cost not greater than kerosene lamps, and without any of the dangers of explosion which attach to the use of kerosene and very much cheaper than it is used to make coal gas. After the machine is purchased and the necessary gas fitting supplied, the only cost of material is gasoline, the gas being generated from the latter by simple contact of air and water. Mr. Miller will take orders to furnish machines, or will sell county rights in Oregon or Washington Territory.
